DIGITAL SLRS

Examples: the Nikon D100, Canon D60. Still pretty pricey, about \$2000, they are neverthe-

They opernot familiar with the Sony, it admits to being able to take photos in pitch dark, using its sensors and flash. The articulated LCD finder on many of these high ends can be placed in practically any position making it very convenient for stealing pictures of people unawares and for reaching the camera over the heads of those around you while still seeing your image. They produce great images, good color rep-

On the negative side:

resentation and excellent prints.

They still suffer from the shutter-lag of the smaller cameras because their CCD sensor array is not much bigger. Using the raw setting on the Nikon causes a 5 second blackout period between shots! Of course, it is faster in the .jpg modes, the lower the resolution the faster the response rate.

Some do not have an optical viewer so you have to rely on the LCD (faster battery use).

They are complicated to operate; you need several hours with the manual before venturing out. Again, at least with the Nikon, there are no filter threads for polarizers or the like which is particularly unfortunate for an \$1100 camera.

While the Nikon uses standard flash memory cards, the Sony F707 uses a proprietary card with a maximum of 128 MB, too small for practical use.

If you buy a high-end digital, there may be auxillairy lenses available for macro and telescopic extensions. Be aware that it is easy to get dust on the sensors when changing these lenses. This is also true for the DSLRs.

cameras are now high enough in resolution to compete with their analog brothers. The 1.5 or 1.6 magnification factor allows a telescopic lens such as a 400 mm to actually work as though you had placed 640 mm lens on the camera. Great for nature photography. Disadvantages exist, however: They still lack wide-angle capabilities, but some

they have a smaller CCD area (about 1.5x small-

er than the full 24×35 mm film frame). These

major lens manufacturers are producing ultra wide-angle lenses specifically for these cameras.

Changing the lenses can all too easily allow dust to get onto your CCD array.

They are still slower than film cameras, but not so noticably as their array is about 2/3 the size of the full-frame 35mm

But to me the major disadvantage would be having to lug these digital cousins and all their lenses around just like your regular SLR. You'll definitely need a tripod too. At least you don't need any film! -loan Field

MORE ON DIGITAL

There seem to be three types of digital cameras—the point and shoot (2 mp - 4 mp resolution with about 3x optical zoom), the higher end digicams (5 - 6 mp resolution with up to 8x optical zoom) and the DSLRs (digital SLRs) with a range of about 5 - 11 megpixels resolution with the zoom dependent on the lens used.

This article is a freeflowing thought process, which will, undoubtedly, be somewhat confusing, but I hope it helps us understand what is actually out there and delineate the pluses and minuses of each type of digital camera.

POINT & SHOOT DIGITALS

There are a number of advantages to these somewhat simpler cameras.

For straightforward shooting, especially of family parties and vacations, they are extremely convenient, generally easy to use, light and ready to hand. The LCD allows instant review and abillity to throw out what you don't want, as is true for all digital cameras. Many of them produce sufficiently high resolution images that can be blown up to 8" x 10" print size of acceptable sharpness. Also these cameras can produce excellent images under low light conditions, much better than a film camera unless you use fast film or flash.

And, if you want to get fancy, there are a huge number of settings that are available — aperture priority, shutter priority, and manual for example. In addition many have a movie capability, albeit very low resolution, of up to three minutes.

On the negative side, the sensor area for the Canon PowerShot S45 is about 0.6", typical of others of this type. This small CCD area creates two major problems:

(1) It will generally have lower resolution output than its bigger competitors

(2) The response time may be as long as a second between the time the shutter is depressed and the photo is taken. This makes it very difficult to photograph objects in motion. (There is a work-around for this, however.)

Because of the short distance between the lens and the sensors, these cameras require extremely wide-angle lenses to produce a zoom range comparable to a 35mm film camera. For instance the Canon above is 7.1mm - 21.3mm just to emulate a 35 - 105mm zoom. Because of this wide angle lens requirement (simplistically speaking), these cameras show extreme depth of field. This is a plus until you want to take an image with the background blurred.

Inherent, also, is the problem of slow-motion photography. If you wanted to show creamy waterfalls or pan a bicyclist, you will have difficulty. The fastest aperture is usually f/8 and on the simpler point and shoot digitals there is no way to attach neutral density filters. Of course, you could try hand-holding them in front of the lens; it might work.

The last negative is the short battery life of digital cameras. Be prepared to carry extra batteries and be within range of a place to hook in a battery charger every day.

In general, the higher end point and shoot digitals are great supplementary cameras for serious photographers. But you'll still want your SLR for serious photography.

HIGHER END DIGICAMS

Nikon Coolpix 5700, Sony F707, and the Minolta Dimage are examples of higher end non-SLR digital cameras.

Advantages: They are still relatively small; e.g. you can carry the Nikon in your capacious pocket. The lens has a much higher optical range than those of their lower-end compatriots. Typical is the 8x optical zoom of the Nikon 5700 and the 7x - 11x zooms of the Dimage. This gives an equivalent 35mm
