## Division Definitions: N4C vs. PSA

Since N4C is a member of the Photographic Society of America, I have observed that some people wonder about the relationship between N4C and PSA when it comes to division definitions and competition rules. So, what is the relationship? To be concise:

#### There is none.

The division definitions and competition rules are defined by the document you can find on our website <a href="https://n4c.org">https://n4c.org</a> when you hover your cursor over "Competitions" and click on "Competition Rules for" the current year. This document has the first, last and only say about what our rules and definitions are. One cannot appeal to the PSA. The N4C rules and definitions reflect how the N4C-member clubs want N4C competitions to be run. That is not always how the PSA sees things.



Of course, the PSA has some pretty smart and dedicated photographers working on division definitions. So naturally the N4C Board pays close attention to what the PSA does. When we see something that *makes* sense for us, we may adopt it, perhaps with modifications.

Another sore point is when different judges have different interpretations of the rules. In some cases this is inevitable, as no set of rules ever covers every circumstance perfectly. And judges are human, so they can be wrong. But, for better or worse, in N4C there is no "Supreme Court" to which a judge's decision can be appealed.

Sometimes variation between judges can become such a source of controversy that the N4C Board needs to address the issue. This can take two forms. In one case, the Board may decide the rules need to be modified. This is a lengthy process requiring a great deal of discussion and back-and-forth with the clubs. It consumes a great deal of the Board's time each year. An alternative is for the Board to publish a position paper clarifying the rule or definition. These are published in Foto Fanfare and are also available at <a href="https://n4c.photoclubservices.com">https://n4c.photoclubservices.com</a> by hovering over "Organization" and clicking on "Documents and Files to Download". Click on the little triangle next to 4.0 Interclub Competition and Judging, then click the triangle next to 4.8 Commentary and Clarifications of Competition Rules and Division Definitions, then 4.81 Current. Note: you do not need to login to access this information.

N4C tries to provide a uniform competition experience by providing a multi-day judges' training program, occasionally holding a Judges Conference, and providing a discussion group for judges on its website.

If you believe a rule or definition needs to be clarified, please discuss this with your club's N4C Representative.

#### Notable Photographers and Their Images

#### Gordon Parks - Poverty, Despair, and Triumph

"I suffered first as a child from discrimination, poverty ... So I think it was a natural follow from that that I should use my camera to speak for people who are unable to speak for

themselves." – Gordon Parks

As often as I can, I go to photography exhibits. It is an added bonus at a great art museum, you can see the photo exhibit and view other art exhibits. A few weeks ago, I traveled to The Cantor Center on the Stanford University campus. I go a few times a year

But Parks had his champions. In his 20s, some photography clerks liked his photos and encouraged him to shoot for local fashion magazines. That work was admired by Marva

Louis, the wife of heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis. He shot portraits of African-Americans and eventually got a photography job at the Farm Security Administration (FSA). This image of a woman with a mop and broom was taken in 1940 is called American Gothic Washington D.C

The woman is Ella Watson, she was a cleaner at the FSA building.

and it is a great experience in a great location.

The Center has put on three photography shows over the three years sponsored by The Capital Group Foundation. The featured artists were Ansel Adams, Ed Weston, Helen Levitt, Wright Morris, and Gordon Parks. I have written about Adams, Weston, and Levitt. Today we discuss Gordon Parks, his photos are in the current exhibit.

Gordon Parks was born in the small town of Fort Scott, Kansas in 1912. He went to a segregated elementary school. The town was too small to have two high schools so all the students went to one high school. The high school did not allow African-Americans to play sports or do other social activities. Parks' mother died when he was 14 and he moved to St. Paul, Minnesota to live with his sister. His brother-in-law evicted him when he was 15. He was on the streets and on his own. Parks worked in various jobs and eventually moved to Chicago.


The photo alludes to Grant Wood's painting *American Gothic.* (The models for that painting were Wood's sister and his dentist.) Parks' *American Gothic Washington D.C.* shows another view of America.

The image makes me sad. The woman has dignity, but given the year and place, I can't help but wonder how much of her life was marginalized by our historical attitudes to race, difference, and poverty. This is validated if you read the backstory on her. The placement of the flag is intentional and I don't think it was meant as a patriotic gesture. To me, the flag adds the "sad" dimension to the image, without the flag, there is a different story. This shows the impact of effective backgrounds.

Lastly, regarding how the public would receive this image – upon seeing this image, Parks' boss feared he and the other photographers would get fired. I guess the Truth cannot only set you free, but can also get you fired. After working at the FSA, Parks went on to open a studio in Harlem and work as a photographer for Standard Oil, Vogue and Life.

Parks documented leaders of the black conscious movements of the 1960s, including members of The Nation of Islam. Here is an image of Ethel Sharrieff, the daughter of The Nation of Islam founder, Elijah Muhammad. We have divergent vanishing lines, I don't recall seeing this technique before. Usually, the vanishing lines converge. Like many of his photos, Parks set this up.

In 1966, Parks visited Muhammad Ali at his training camp in Miami, Florida as an assignment for Life magazine. Parks' essay, "The Redemption of the Champion", included this photo.





Time for a pop quiz.

What camera club "rule" does this portrait violate?

The top of Ali's head is outside the camera frame. Parks chose to show more of Ali's torso instead. You very rarely see this in our competitions – there is a knee-jerk reaction to make this type of framing wrong. I recall discussing this technique in my article on Richard Avedon (Foto Fanfare, October 2020). Avedon did some frame-cropping of body parts in his portraits. And, of course, it is a very common post-processing crop for the cover of fashion magazines.

I saw this technique in a competition I judged last year. The photo had a group of very young soccer players chasing the ball and a few had the top of their heads out-of-frame. It gave the image a dynamic and looming feeling and I remember it to this day. I acknowledged and awarded the artist's risk-taking.

For me, I think the technique makes Ali's image more successful, it suggests his presence and power cannot be contained by the frame of the camera.

I viewed the Parks exhibit twice, once by myself and then again in a docent tour. The docent asked a compelling question: How does one represent bigotry in art?

She said Parks did it by showing the results: poverty and despair. I think Parks succeeded.

The Parks exhibit lasts until July 3, 2022. After that, the 15-odd photos will be "rested" and unavailable to the public for five years. The museum is free, but you have to book a ticket on the museum's website. There is paid parking in front of the museum, it is inexpensive and parking is free on the weekends.

After my visits to The Cantor, I walk over to *The Tree House* cafe and get something to eat. It is open year round and they have plenty of healthy dishes. That said, I couldn't resist the grilled pastrami sandwich. It was good. Another casual on-campus eatery is *The Axe and Palm*. Both places are a pleasant 15-minute walk from the museum.



#### Stab from the Past

An occasional informal history of the Northern California Council of Camera Clubs, ripped from the pages of Foto Fanfare

#### 1968

The tagline for Foto Fanfare was "News and Views for Camera Clubs and Photographers". The office was located in the Photo Center at 50 Scott St, San Francisco.

The new president, Phil Thomas, wrote "we hope to create somehow more interest in print making – both black & white and color. ... Slide photography has taken a hold."

The new president also added a new item to the standard agenda for Council meetings: "Good and Welfare of the Council". This let Delegates and others talk about "the betterment and advancement of amateur photography" without a motion on the floor.

The Oakland Camera Club presented a 4session seminar series on color slide photography at the Kaiser Center Auditorium in Oakland

on January 26th and 27th. The session on informal portrait photography promised to "Show how YOU too can look beautiful with any brand of soap". Over 200 people attended and gave the presenter a standing ovation.

The curator of this column observes that college photography instructors were active participants in area camera clubs, often as judges. Unfortunately, I

am learning this only from their deaths being announced in the pages of Foto Fanfare.

The San Francisco International Color Slide Exhibition, sponsored by the Photochrome Camera

Club, added a "Contemporary Photography" category. This included "impressionistic", "experimental", or "altered slides which involve new techniques or processing which makes them different from the traditional or academic presentation".

People were impressed with the results that could be obtained under low light conditions using the new Anscochome 500 color slide film. At ASA 500, it was faster than all but the fastest B&W films.

George Giles planned a photo trip to Death Valley April 8th through the 13th. A Guide was provided by Stove Pipe Wells. A second trip to Death Valley took place November 27th-December 1st. He also organized a Camera Caravan to Yosemite April 26th-28th and again on November 1st – 3rd.

The March Council meeting is designated "Presidents' Night". All club presidents are asked to attend and have a group photo taken.

A proposal was made to add a "Nature Color Slide" division. There was concern that this would make the monthly competitions take too long.

The PSA 2<sup>nd</sup> Pacific Regional Convention was held in Sacramento April 5<sup>th</sup> through 7<sup>th</sup>.

A majority of Rossmore's membership take a great many travel shots and they are puzzled by the question of what makes a travel or record shot

different from and inferior to a competitive transparency. The club conducted a special competition called "The Innocent Eye" where members were asked to photography the Bay Area as seen through the eyes of a just-arrived tourist from Peru.

Found quotes: "Black and White photography illustrates the power of negative thinking" and "How come human nature is not accepted in nature photography?"

The Peninsula Color Slide Club sponsored a lecture series on color slide photography by Helen Manzer, Ph.D, FPSA, ARPS on May 16th through 19th at the Beresford Recreation Center in San Mateo. It was cosponsored by the San Mateo Recreation Department.

Comment by Club News editor Charles Dieter: "...unfortunately for some of us the critical exposure to camera club competitions causes us to narrow our channels of expression unduly and often to pass up meaningful and interesting subjects because they do not classify as 'what judges like'."

This year's Photography Day at Stern Grove included booths by photo equipment distributors, airlines, and tourist bureaus. The New Zealand Tourist Bureau booth included Maori Dancers.

Twenty-five clubs were affiliated with N4C.

Focus Gallery, the first gallery in San Francisco devoted to photography, was operated by Helen

Johnston, and Associate in N4C and member of the Sunset and Berkeley Camera Clubs. Showing at the gallery were photographs by Rose Mandel, senior

photographer for the Department of Fine Arts, UC Berkeley and the series "North Beach and Haight Ashbury" by Imogen Cunningham.

N4C sponsored a lecture by Chinsan Long, Founder and President of the Photographic Society of China and teacher at the National Taiwan College of Fine Arts on September 7<sup>th</sup> at the Lakeside Park Garden Center, Oakland.

The Vista Camera Club was formed and applied for membership in N4C. Also new this year is the China Town Photographic Society. Their headquarters include a studio and darkroom for use of their members.

FotoClave took place November 9th and 10th at the Hyatt House Hotel in San Jose. One of the favorite sessions was "Photography on a Card Table". Other sessions included "Titles without Troubles" and "Water and Crystal Magic". There was also a model shoot and a field trip.

An essay on the difference between an "exhibition" and a "competition" was published in the August edition of Foto Fanfare.

This year's editions of Foto Fanfare were full of articles on what "Nature Photography" is.

At the November Council meeting it was decided to hold the Interclub color print competition every two months.



#### The Big Debate: Print vs Projected

When I set out to interview photographers, I expected to find clashing opinions over the value of print images versus projected images. Instead, I've learned that it's like Cheerios versus Corn Flakes... everyone has a preference, but it doesn't make one better than the other.

"It's another avenue of expression," said Gary Oehrle, past Vice President and Print Chair at N4C. "I enjoy

looking at my prints hanging on the wall, and they bring back memories of places, times, events, and friends."

"Many consider printing, matting, framing and titling important parts of a maker's creation," explained Jane Postiglione. "Ansel Adams dodged and burned the heck out of his images; he cropped and changed the aspect ratio for *Moon Over Hernandez*, making it dark and moody. It was part of his genius. When you print, each end product is unique."

Irene Bergamini admits that it's time consuming and expensive to do your own photo printing, but she embraces it because, "It's your legacy--your expression--your creativity. When it's on a hard drive no one sees it."

"Before Covid, we would display all the prints at our club meeting, and everyone would walk around and discuss the images. It made for a more rewarding,

interactive event," according to Oehrle. "I never heard anyone ask to see a projected image again."

Both print and projected categories have their place in Club competitions. You may be up against different competitors, and it gives you more opportunities to get feedback.

#### Ready to Take the Plunge?

Postiglione suggests you start by deciding who the print is for:

- Are you planning to hang it on the wall at home?
- Is it for a buyer?
- Are you exhibiting at a local gallery or event? \*
- Are you donating it to an organization or entering a competition?

Each usage may have its own very specific requirements for size, print medium, matting, framing and even hanging hardware, so you should always ask for the specs. N4C club competitions conform with the print rules in <u>section 2.11 of the N4C Interclub Competition Rules</u>.

#### **Your Home Printing Setup**

When asked about the costs, Postiglione warned, "Doing it all yourself can be complicated, time consuming and costly, and it requires skills and lots of futzing, testing and more testing. But it allows you to portray just what you want the audience to see and feel."

Before you lay out big money for equipment, you might want to do some research and **get yourself educated.** Bergamini took a three-day class from <u>Stephen Johnson</u> where she learned how to prepare her images for printing, how to calibrate equipment, color management and profiles, print aesthetics, and more. (During Covid, Johnson started offering many of <u>his courses online</u>). Lots of learning resources are available online and through your local club.

One approach that limits the cost is to **print your images in standard sizes** so you can use standard size mats and frames, though this also constrains how you crop (your aspect ratios). For smaller homes (like

every few months without reconfiguring the gallery wall is a big plus.

All three photographers I interviewed have their own **printers**. Watch your local stores and online retailers for sales and rebates on large format printers. **Ink cartridges** can be a big expense, but some photographers save by buying less expensive bulk ink and refilling the cartridges themselves.

mine) with limited wall space, being able to swap out an image

Your **paper choice**, which can have a big impact on the artistry of your finished product, includes matte or glossy, lustre, metallic, and different colors or tones just to name a few.

Let's not forget the option of **using a photo lab** to print your images. This can be a good solution if you work with a conscientious shop that understands the nuances. For the best results, learn how to prepare your digital file for their printer and give clear instructions when you send it in.

**Bottom Line:** Gary Oehrle suggests you find an economical way to print, and try it in club competitions for a year.
