#### 1974

The Nature Judging training was so successful it had to move to a larger facility. One session was on judging wildflowers, the trainers included an experienced judge, a botanist and a representative from the

California Native Plants
Society. There were
also sessions on judging
insects and small living
creatures, wild birds,
and mammals. The
chair of the Nature
Division suggested
clubs review the
definition of Nature
Photography, and
discuss it in advance
with their judges. Also
make sure Nature slides
are titled.

A 10-week class on Nature Photography was instituted that included field trips. Topics included scenes, wildflowers, fungi, birds, insects, mammals and

macrophotography. Cost was \$3 per person.

Inflation (~12% annualized) and the energy crisis were two of the challenges N4C had to deal with. (Sound familiar? – DGS) The interclub print competition procedure was changed so the Print Chair did not have to burn expensive gasoline traveling to the host club.

Retlaw Camera Club rejoined N4C after last year's controversy!

No Photo Day this year due to lack of interest by the clubs.



# Notable Photographers and Their Images

#### **Édouard Boubat - Embracer of Life**

"After the war I was 20 years old. I wanted to live. My photos, like gateways in time, opened the world for me. "Hit the road"! You must snap the photo. You must embrace life so that it comes alive." - Édouard Boubat

November is here and we got our first good rain. Despite the many problems in the world, we Californios have had a bit of a break from the massive and numerous fires we had in the last few years. Something to be grateful for.

This month's photographer was grateful. Grateful he had survived World War II as a captive french laborer of the Nazis and grateful he could pursue a career in photography after the inhumanity and madness of warfare.

Édourd Boubat wanted to leave the experience of war in his past and celebrate life. He picked up a camera in 1946 and put that plan in action. I

think that can be seen in this picture of three children tracing their hands on a chalkboard.

This picture is evocative. Children having fun doing simple things, simple things adults rarely do unless they are making art.

The girls are making what anthropologists call "negative hands". Negative hands are found in prehistoric caves and rock formations. Our ancient ancestors would put a pigment in their mouths, spit onto a wall where they had placed their hand and create an outline.

I think most experienced photographers would agree with me that most successful images do two things: hold your interest and evoke emotion. I propose all types of art can be evaluated or analyzed by these two dimensions.

Why something is interesting can be nebulous. We can deconstruct a photo with words but, to me, that can diminish the gestalt of the image. I have to be careful of this when I am judging competitions, especially when I want to sound eloquent, but really have nothing meaningful to say. (Yes, sad but true.)



For the most powerful images, I step back and tell the audience that the photographer is giving us a lesson; it is better to just enjoy the image than for me to compositionally deconstruct it. One must tread carefully with criticism and deconstruction, they can taint or trash the viewing experience of others. This happens with poetry and lyrics too. Someone gives

their personal take on a poem or song and that interpretation gets in your mind like a bad and persistent earworm.

Interest and emotion are stimulated by our psyche and experiences, something that surfaces from the past which had previously been forgotten or displaced by day-to-day living. Perhaps this is why humans have the urge to create and discuss art. To communicate and share emotions from our experiences.

Art fosters a transcendence. I think collectors are trying to possess this experience. Perhaps this is the reason for the exorbitant price of some art, the owner can seemingly possess a collective transcendence.

Humans are meaning-assigning machines, we are hardwired for it. And art is a wonderful playground for meaning assignment. Let's use that context to explore this image of a chicken that Boudat took in the 1950s.



What emotion and experience does it invoke in you?

What is interesting to you? What meaning have you assigned?

I never owned a chicken and neither have been around them much, but I like them. I like all animals, even the huge, live crickets my three-legged cat brings into the house and plays with on the kitchen floor. Every year, Alameda has a Chicken Coop Open House and I usually jump on my bicycle and visit a few of the coops. You learn about chickens and get free snacks. You gotta like that.

I have been told chickens are intelligent and have distinctive personalities. Also, that cats are afraid of them. I found this fact a little puzzling; chickens seem rather harmless to me. Of course, I have not had one try to peck my eyeball, which is probably the cat experience.

By now, some of you are probably wondering why I am free-associating about chickens.

Good question.

The point is that we can experience an image without analyzing or deconstructing it with photographic conventions. There is plenty of compositional goodness in this image of a chicken on a patio, but mechanically deconstructing it has the potential to detract from the simple enjoyment of the image.

That said, I can't stop myself. Allow me one small, and hopefully pleasant, deconstruction.

Check out the pair of shoes in the image. The way they have been carefully placed diagonally against the wall. These shoes were important to someone.

This minor detail makes the image more meaningful for me. And of course, I can intellectually riff on this. The shoes imply both presence and absence, the owner is not in the image, but we are informed by the existence of their shoes.

I have referenced cats several times. I take a lot of pictures of my cats. Boubat was a cat lover and took pictures of cats too. This image of cats on the roofs of Paris is titled – La Reunion de Gatos.



Boubat embraced life by traveling the world with his camera. We are doing the same.
