

President's Corner

I went to New Zealand last month and came back with a picture of a leaf. What? At least from a photographic standpoint, that's how it seemed.

Don't get me wrong. New Zealand is a beautiful country, and it was a very interesting trip. I learned a lot from our guides and docents. For instance, I really had no idea that humans didn't inhabit Aotearoa (the Maori name for New Zealand) until just 800 years ago when the Maori arrived. Before that, it was islands of birds. No mammals (except a couple of bats) meaning essentially no predators, which is why so many of the birds in New Zealand

are/were flightless. This included a wingless bird called the Moa. which stood 11 feet tall. I'd never heard of this dinosaur-looking bird before, and I certainly didn't know that it went extinct just 400 years ago. When the Maori arrived, they found the Moa to be a great source of food. They also brought rats with them to the islands, and the rats loved eating the Moa eggs. So, within 400 years, the Moa were hunted to extinction. The country is now very conservation minded and has a campaign to make the islands predator free by 2050. Wow. This effort, in part, is to protect the country's beloved, but now highly endangered, Kiwi bird, which by the way, has the shortest beak of any bird species. That's right. It's because the Kiwi bird's nostrils are at the very end of its bill (for

sniffing out grub, bugs, etc. in the debris on the forest floor), and the official measure of a beak is from the nostrils to the end of the bill.

Of course, there are a lot of sheep in New Zealand. It is a very rural, farm-based country in general. But did you know that most of the deer in the country are now in domesticated herds, right alongside the cattle and sheep? We had a lot of great venison while we were there. From a cultural standpoint, because the British did not settle in New Zealand until a treaty was signed with the Maori in 1840,

less than 200 years ago, the mix of Maori and British influenced culture is more inclusive and respectful than you see in other colonized countries/cultures. Whatever the influences, we found that the people were great everywhere we went.

What does any of this have to do with photography? Well, those of you who have non-photographer partners/spouses/friends with whom you travel know that there is a big difference between a travel tour and a photo trip. And while, as a photographer, it can be frustrating at times, we sometimes have to do what they want to do, even if it means that many

of our best opportunities for photography are with a cell phone from a moving bus. So, I found myself getting off the bus at a rest stop 7,000 miles away in New Zealand and taking a picture of a leaf! (I couldn't decide whether to laugh about it or shake my head.)

While I lugged my camera bag and/or at least one "real" camera everywhere we went, I had very few opportunities to actually use any of it, which meant that I over-encumbered myself (and at times, my husband) with equipment. Of course, therein lies the rub. Could I have gone on this trip without my camera bag and still enjoyed it? In hindsight, yes. But I didn't know what to expect, and I just couldn't bring myself, when I was packing, to take the chance of missing a good shot. Or could I have? I

certainly have made my husband stand around while I photograph things. So maybe it's okay if I don't always have a camera with me for every trip or outing, and I just participate in the moment as a tourist? I'm not sure I can bring myself to do that! (Although, I was reminded on this trip of just how good and convenient cell phone cameras can be.) I will likely always pack camera equipment for every trip, even if I'm just supposed to be a "tourist" and end up taking snapshots instead of creating photographs. There's value in those memories too!



Klea McKenna: Giving Nature a New Voice

"Doug Stinson of the Fremont club is our guest columnist this month. Doug is an experienced judge and always has interesting perspectives on photographs and I am very excited to have him contribute to the column."

Klea McKenna is a San Francisco photographer just awarded a prestigious 2023 Guggenheim Fellowship. The John Simon

Guggenheim Memorial Foundation offers fellowships to exceptional individuals in pursuit of scholarship in any field of knowledge and creation in any art form, under the freest possible conditions. Previous photographers receiving the fellowship include Ansel Adams. Diane Arbus. Robert Frank, Walker Evans and Sally Mann. And while it is always nice to have a relatively young (born 1977) local person recognized, McKenna also happens to be one of my favorite photographers.

I first saw McKenna's work at the Euginom

Gallery's group show Of Many Minds in 2016. I was immediately struck by her creativity. She abandoned straight photography to "look for a kind of visual freedom", hoping for "alchemy rather than the replication that photography was designed for".

Here are three examples of McKenna's work. After looking carefully at the images, and before reading further, answer these questions:

1. What memories do these images evoke?

- 2. What feelings do these images arouse?
- 3. Where do you think these images were made?




Figure 1 from her series Rainstorms & Rain Studies. She began making these prints when she lived with her parents (whom she describes as "renegade ethnobotanists") on the big island of Hawaii. On the darkest nights she would take large sheets of silver gelatin paper into the forest. She would allow rain to fall on the paper and illuminate the drops from various angles with a flashlight. Then she would take the paper back to the darkroom

and develop it. She continued her work in California during the drought. "I have always paid attention to rainfall and how weather affects the land", McKenna reports, "but by making this work my awareness has been heightened. The constant anticipation of rain and the act of documenting it on the rare occasions that it comes, has become my own sort of rain dance."

Figure 2 is from her Faults project. These start as rubbings of photographic fiber paper placed against cracks in rock and cement, made in total darkness. They are then exposed to light, developed and collaged together to create fictional forms. They range in size from 20 to 42 feet wide. The figure is a portion of the installation in the Euginom Gallery exhibition.

Figure 3 is from her series Automatic Earth. These are made in the same way as the Faults photographs, except these start as handembossed imprints of cross-sections of trees. In McKenna's view "It is where the pattern breaks that we are told something: a draught, a trauma, an interaction, the slash of a chainsaw.... a crack in the earth. The flaws in these pre-destined forms become a record of time and of labor and they tell the story of the life that made them."

McKenna describes her process as follows: "I begin with a response to a particular location or element; one that has a personal or collective emotional charge. With a desire to record an imprint - rather than a picture of it - I devise ways that light-sensitive materials can interact directly with elements of an ecosystem. To me, landscape is an animate and emotive force rather than a pastoral depiction." Her work requires a degree of tactility and physical contact that are missing in traditional photography—they are evidence of an exchange, an interaction. She views her work as a collaboration with nature.

The particular processes Klea McKenna uses are very meaningful to her as an artist and as a person. Do the resulting images inspire the same sense of meaning in you, the viewer?


In March all the club presidents got together for their traditional annual group portrait.
