

A San Francisco Hidden Gem



Lands End Labyrinth

What Is It? San Francisco artist Eduardo Aguilera's labyrinth at Lands End, a rocky and windswept shoreline at the mouth of the Golden Gate, is one of the most spectacularly beautiful secrets the city holds.

Why Do It? With sweeping vistas of the bridge, the Marin Headlands and the Pacific beyond, its location is naturally tranquil and majestic.

Good to Know: Destroyed a number of times and rebuilt, the labyrinth isn't officially endorsed by the Lands End National Park area, and the trails that lead to the promontory are unmaintained, so you'll need to be extra careful in this frequently windy and slippery location.

N4C Judge's Training

Local camera club members, N4C wants to hold a training session for new judges and we need you!

Why should you want to become a judge? I think Charlie Ginsberg said it best:

- Do you enjoy viewing images and speaking about photography?
- Do you enjoy teaching or providing instruction?
- Do you enjoy giving back to the SF bay area photography community in general?

As an N4C judge, you will have the opportunity to travel to many of the other N4C Club sites (both in person and virtually), and to examine and comment on images generated by club members.

As a judge, you will be asked to comment on images and to put into words what it is that you feel about each image. You will need to know the actual N4C rules, but more importantly, you will need to communicate what it is that you feel is effective or is less than effective regarding each image.

Our next Judge Training Session is scheduled for October 14, 2023 from 9:30 AM to 4:30 PM at the William E Walker Recreation Center in Foster City. In the morning some existing judges will talk about various aspects of judging. Lunch will be provided and you will have an opportunity to meet existing N4C judges with a goal of selecting two judges to be your mentors. The afternoon session will be an opportunity for you to critique actual competitions.

There is a charge for the training of \$50, which will be refunded to you when you have completed the mentoring portion of the training.

After the training session you are required to work with two mentors to further hone your skills. This section of the training is up to the mentor, but N4C expects that the trainee will critique at least one category at two different competitions nights per mentor (so critiquing four actual categories). The mentor will actually select the winners. Your mentor should work with you on identifying what stands out in an image and what needs work, recognizing the different skills for each levels, and other aspects of examining an image. My own mentors also worked on other aspects; different ways to say things so it doesn't sound like you are repeating yourself, and working to remove "ums" and "ahs" from your speech.

Once both of your mentors have signed off that you are ready to judge on your own N4C will refund your \$50 fee. You will be asked to fill out a bio to be provided to the clubs. As you are the chair for 2 competitions I assume you have seen several judges' bios and know what to expect. I will provide a sample form that you can update to reflect yourself.

Notable Photographers and Their Images

Larry Sultan - A Pool With A View

"Ambiguity is really important to me." – Larry Sultan

I had a newspaper route when I was young. At that time, newspapers were delivered by young teens, almost entirely boys. Girls had babysitting and boys had paper routes and shoveling snow. Delivering papers was a good job. I was my own boss and I saved money for college.

Buffalo was a two-paper town. The Courier-Express was the morning paper and the Buffalo Evening News was delivered in the late afternoon. One of the predecessors of the Courier-Express was the Buffalo Express. In 1869, Mark Twain acquired a partial ownership of that newspaper and edited and contributed stories and commentaries. He moved on after 18 months, he was a rambler.

When I was growing up, most houses subscribed to the Buffalo Evening News. The news cycle was slower back then, you could wait until after work to read or watch the news. Nowadays, our eyes are immersed in our cell phones or computer screens. People used to talk to each other before the start of company meetings. Now they fiddle with their phones. Could you imagine someone reading a newspaper in a team meeting and ignoring the other people in the room? Think of the discourtesy of that image. That is what I think of when I see people bury their heads in a phone before and during group meetings.

We are now a culture obsessed with being unpresent to the people around us; they are not exciting enough for our attention. Real people can not compete with the latest images of Kim Khadasian wearing yet another new dress. Sociologists have commented on this phenomenon and how it affects our interactions. Children now inspire to be influencers instead of teachers. That is a job where you do stupid or meaningless things to get people's attention. Insert a sad trombone sound here.

Regarding hardcopy newspapers, my neighbor still gets the Wall Street Journal delivered to his doorstep. I hear the braking and door shutting of the delivery man's car in the early morning. Sometimes

I get up and watch the delivery man from my second story bedroom window. I wondered how much money he is making from delivering newspapers. He must have another full time job.

I like watching life through the windows in my house, just like my cats. We do it together. Me standing by one bedroom window and one or two of the cats on the tall storage hamper by the next window. The hamper is the perfect height for them to stretch out and watch bikes, people and dogs and their walkers go by. It is the cat version of TV, but better because the scenarios are real. No perfectly prescribed dialogues and no bodies found face down in poorly lit New York City alleys. By the way, Manhattan doesn't have a lot of alleys. It is almost completely alley free. Yet, bodies keep showing up in those few alleys every week on police shows. There are lots of alleys in San Francisco, there was one behind my apartment in North Beach. A Chinatown gangland murder was committed on my street in the 1970s. In this case, a body really was found in an alley. I walked down that alley everyday for 14 years.

My girlfriend makes fun of me for my "window watching". Okay, I admit it, neighborhood spying is a little creepy. But I know my neighbors do it; they make comments about things that they have seen through their windows. People are watching more than we know. Big Brother has always been here.

That reminds me of Gladys Kravitz. She was the nosey neighbor on Bewitched, frequently seeing bizarre events at the Stephen's house from her living room window. She would relay them to her husband who was reading the newspaper in a comfy chair. He always had a dismissive, yet poignantly funny comment about her snooping. She was a great character, probably because there is a little Gladys Kravitz in all of us.

There is something empowering about viewing things from a hidden perspective, a place where you are not visible. This concept leads us to spying from another hidden perspective: underwater in public pools.

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Today's photographer is Larry Sultan. He was afraid of water. To combat this fear, he took swimming lessons at public pools in Los Angeles and reflections of the water make it a tad surreal. We don't see any faces. The swimmers are anonymous.

The image made me chuckle. It entertained me. That may occur as a bit obnoxious, but it is what I

felt. The red suits against the pale blue pool are a great contrast. There is a wonderful symmetry in the bodies and the positions of the swimmers. I think the hand reaching out towards the back of the other swimmer implies an intimacy, a sharing of experience and comradery. I am really drawn to that detail.

Next patient, an image of a child below water, *Figure 2.*

San Francisco in the 70s and 80s. Not sure why, but he brought an underwater camera and flash with him. Here is one of his images of two women in a pool, *Figure 1*.

There is mystery in this image. The perspective is uncommon and creative. The shimmering and

I was wowed by this image. It too made me chuckle. But the more I looked at it, the more thought provoking it was. The child's face almost looks like a renaissance painting, something you would see in a museum or church in Italy. There is a pleasant chaos to this image, a powerful gestalt experience. I think cropping or removing objects from this image would be vandalism.

Third, we have this image of a woman and man wearing blue bathing suits, *Figure 3*.

The Courier-Express went out of business in 1982. By that time, I had finished college and left the gloom of the Rust Belt for the heat and humidity of New Orleans. I am glad I had that paper route. I was up and out in the world before most other people. I used my bike, it was a great way to start the day. In the winter, I often had to walk my route because there was too much snow on the streets to ride. I remember the strange whiteness and the feel and sound of the snow crunching under my boots while I walked in the dark. I forgot how beautiful snow could be.

No need to crop that red suit out of the lower right corner, we can just be with it. To me, it makes the image more interesting. There is nothing "wrong" about it. It won't hurt us.

I wondered how Sultan got permission to take these images. Who shows up to a swim class with their underwater camera? The other swimmers must have thought it a bit strange, having a guy with a camera lurking under the water. I guess this was a time when people were more relaxed around cameras.

Stab from the Past

An occasional informal history of the Northern California Council of Camera Clubs, ripped from the pages of Foto Fanfare

1987

This year Foto FanFare did not publish any information about what went on at Board meetings.

A seminar by David Cavagnaro was held at San Francisco State on February 21st covering "Mastering Selective Focus" and "Photographing People the Wildlife Way".

Beginning in March all N4C Interclub Competitions were held on the 3rd Saturday of the month at the Rossmoor Gateway Clubhouse. Members of all clubs were welcome to attend.

The editor announced that "each month we will try to have several camera clubs featured in Foto FanFare in the hope that you'll get to know your neighbors better".

Foto Fanfare published a history of the Rossmoor Camera Club. The club was organized in 1966. The club produced a print display of 24 to 36 color prints for display in a common area twice per year. Prints were developed in their darkroom by members. There were four competition meetings and one program meeting each month.

The Ross Valley Camera Club was formed in 1949 and was the only camera club in Marin County. They


had a competition meeting with separate judges for prints and slides. In addition, they had field trips, workshops, potluck dinners, a picnic and special programs often held in the homes of members.

The Palo Alto Camera Club was organized on 7 January 1935. The club's leaders were advanced print makers and were interested in exhibitions of the work of the club's members. Guest speakers

and judges during the club's first year included George Allen Young, Editor of *Camera Craft*. An early member was Gertrude Pool who was ranked the #3 woman photography exhibitor in the world in the 1955 issue of *Who's Who in Photography*.

The Acorn Camera club, originally named "Las Arts Camera Club" was founded in September 1955. It was well known for field trips to Yosemite, Monterey, and mining areas. Unfortunately, by 1987 its membership had dropped to eight, and it no longer participated in N4C events.

One of the founders of the San Carlos Camera Club in 1952 was Newell Sharkey who later became Mayor of San Carlos and owned a camera store where the club met. Another founder, Walter Cameron went on to form the Retlaw Camera Club.

The original gavel of the President was made from wood from the first tree planted in San Carlos. At some point the club changed its name to the Focus Photographic Society. The Society sponsored events such as the Hillsdale Show and the Serramonte Juried Salon.

The Concord Camera Club disbanded and merged with the Diablo Valley Camera Club.

J: Advertising actually works! Especially when it contains gorgeous photos of exotic places. I usually have myself trained to delete or ignore ads, but when a brochure from the Photographic Society of America arrived in my inbox touting their first International Photo Gathering in India, I was immediately sucked in. I forwarded it to some of the more adventurous members of my club, and amazingly got a positive response! Thus began a great photographic adventure.

E: India hits you in all senses. Only a few steps off the tuk tuk and I find my foot in a pile of cow poop. Wipe it off on this burlap lying in the street, gestures the driver. There is a cacophony of sound. "Beep beep beep" go 20 or so motor scooters, tuk tuks and cars. Vendor voices call "Buy here. All made by women", "Can I clean your shoes?". It's essential to watch out everywhere. There are open ditches in the streets, stairs with no railings, steps of all varying heights, and always garbage and animal droppings. The cattle have horns. One uses them to head butt a few in our party, but fortunately there were no serious injuries. Watch ahead. Follow the guide with the red hat. Don't

lose him or you'll lose the group, not to mention yourself. But there are cars and motor scooters and cows between you and him. And so many amazing things to photograph. Now here comes a funeral procession carrying a body on a stretcher. Cameras down please. Group photography in India has special challenges.

But then there are the people. So friendly. So proud. And what's this? They want to have their pictures taken? Four girls run up to me and shout "Selfie, selfie, selfie!" I take their picture. Never mind the reverse grammar.

Somehow, we have landed in a part of the world that is not tired of foreign tourists. In fact, they find us unique. A young woman, dressed in a gorgeous red sari and veil, bejeweled in all her finery for the Miss Mumbai competition, lets me take her picture. Then she asks her friend to take a picture of herself with me standing beside her. In a small

village, a man hands me his baby so he can take a photo of me and holding her. I am simply a 72-year-old woman in bland travel clothes with a camera hanging around my neck. But I am foreign. Perhaps I look exotic to them?

The PSA Photo Gathering was centered in the city of Jaisalmer, in the Western desert state of Rajasthan. Jaisalmer is known for its "Golden Fort", built in the 11th century from the yellow sandstone that is everywhere. 4000 people live in this fort, set high above Jaisalmer City. During the pandemic they were not allowed to leave the walls for six months. It is a city within a city, and became our favorite hangout.

J: Planned activities took up a lot of our time, but when we were free, we gravitated to the Fort, a 10-minute tuk tuk ride away from our hotel. The fort is a

jumbled maze of businesses, restaurants, homes, both elaborate and humble, hotels and temples, situated along beautiful, winding stone passages. People, shopkeepers and residents alike, were unfailingly friendly and helpful, and the views down into the city were stunning. There was even a restaurant that served something other than Indian food! I took over 6,000 photos during the trip, and a considerable number were in the Golden Fort.

E: The eight-day itinerary was centered around the three-day Winter Desert Festival. People from all over the region and the world got together to watch and participate in a number of unusual performances and contests, while dressed in their finest costumes and uniforms. Festivities started with a procession from the Fort to the stadium: men riding

their camels while brandishing swords over their heads, women with facial jewelry from their noses to their ears, carrying vessels on their heads, drummers, dancers, camel-mounted musicians, and, finally, all the town folk following along. For someone who loves to photograph people, it was heaven.

August 2023

During the festival there was a turban tying contest for natives and one for foreigners, a Mr. Desert contest (the longest mustache won!), a decorated camel contest, tug-o-war competitions with Indians against foreigners, military men throwing rifles with bayonets in the air in precision, acrobatics on camels, a camel race, a camel marching band, horse races, camel polo and more. Just watching the people between events was an event.

there was such a large group from Indonesia who all seemed to know each other well. The next PSA gathering, two years from now, will be in Indonesia, and I imagine many from this group will be among the volunteers. Unfortunately, with language differences and general exhaustion on my part from the long days, it was not easy to get to know the other photographers.

The group hired models for almost all of our excursions. They were young Indian women dressed in traditional costumes, accompanied by a chaperone. It was

On the days before and after the festival we were taken by buses to surrounding villages, archaeological sites, a wildlife refuge and sand dunes. there were 120 photographers. Note to self - never travel with that many photographers again. Bus number 1 held all the Americans. Bus number 2, all from India, Bus number 3 - the Indonesians, Bus number 4, everyone else (UK, Canada, Australia, China, etc.). I found it interesting that

interesting at first to photograph them posed in front of archeological ruins, but it soon got old. How long do you want to stand in a crowd of sometimes pushy

photographers to get a few hundred posed and unnatural feeling shots that can't be used as Travel photos? One of our best experiences happened after a 2-hour bus ride to see demoiselle cranes. When the one hundred or so photographers piled out of the buses and rushed toward the birds, the cranes flew away. Our guide decided to take the

models to an archeological site about a 1.5 kilometer walk away. We decided to explore the local village instead. There we found friendly people proudly showing off their homes and children and rabbits and inviting us in for chai. The kids especially liked practicing their English and asking many questions. And then the cranes came back - a lovely day.

J: One of my favorite non-festival experiences was a visit to an area of sand dunes outside of Jaisalmer. It was a Sunday afternoon and many local people were there to have a fun day. When we got off the bus, we were greeted by the sight of hundreds of people climbing sand dunes. riding or leading camels, and lining the dune tops to watch the dune bashers on motor bikes ride up the faces of the dunes. It was aptly called Camelpalooza by my travel companion. The atmosphere was festive and peaceful, and our large group of photographers dispersed into the excitement and activities and I hardly saw any of them again until it was time to leave.

Our second dune visit was totally different. We visited a desert camp which specialized in providing a desert experience for city people. A large group of us were taken, via camel, to a lovely spot out in the dunes where a traditional band and dancers provided entertainment as we waited to see the sun set. The camels being led away to a resting place made an exotic sight against the red sky. We then walked or rode back to the camp where we were treated to more entertainment and a traditional meal, followed by dancing. A truly delightful evening.

We were totally amazed by what PSA was able to provide over eight days for a modest \$360 fee! Sunrise excursions, archeological sites, visits to small villages and a camel farm, guided tours through Jaisalmer city, camel rides through the sand dunes, and even a visit to sunset point, with its elaborate pavilions and outdoor crematorium. And, of course, the three-day Winter Desert Festival! The whole experience was a multicultural immersion and photographic opportunity. It was sensory overload and exhaustion. But even more, there was a sense of being part of something special. Everywhere we went we were asked if we were with the 120 foreign photographers by people who seemed both impressed and welcoming. A most memorable adventure!


