

President's Corner

I don't know about you, but I am a creature of habit. I find something that works, and I stick with it. But does that foster creativity or hinder it? One could argue both. In photography, comfort and familiarity--with equipment, settings, locations--can alleviate stresses and guesswork and allow for quick action when needed (especially when your subject or your light is fleeting). However, it can also put us in a rut.

We've all heard the saying that doing the same thing over and over again but expecting different results is a definition of insanity. As photographers, we want to master techniques and become expert at a particular style or location. But too much of a good thing can also

lead to our end results all looking/feeling the same. That monotony can squelch our creativity and ultimately our sense of satisfaction in our work.

Despite the fact that, in general, human nature avoids change, as artists, we have to constantly challenge ourselves to look at things in new and different ways, to try different approaches and techniques, and to push ourselves outside of our comfort zones. It is a challenge for many of us, but when we do, the results can be exciting.

Case in point...on safari in Tanzania a few years ago, we left camp in the early morning darkness and found a family of lions on a hillside in the pre-dawn light. We took joy in watching them play and interact but could not get any great photos of them due to obstacles, distance, and light (or lack thereof). At one point, the adult male and female briefly laid down, side by side on top of the ridge to seemingly survey their domain (and probably keep an eye on their four rambunctious cubs). It was a beautiful moment. But was there enough light for the photo?

It turned out that the answer was no. The subjects were great. The composition was great. But there just was not

enough light, and the photo was too soft! Oh, the frustration! We've all felt it at some time or other.

When I got home, I kept going back to that photo, with that little voice of regret saying, "what if I'd tried this" or "if only (something) was just a little different". I continued to look at that photo in the same way I looked at all my photos as a wildlife photographer who submits for competition. At some point, though, it hit me. What if I took a different approach to this photo? What if I stepped outside my usual way of thinking, my comfort zone, and tried learning/using some creative techniques on it?



I was so driven by the frustration and desire that the photo of the lion pair shouldacoulda-woulda been better than it was, that I did something unusual for me. I played around with techniques, filters, and an altered reality vision that I usually avoided for my photography. I'm so glad I pushed myself to try a new approach, because I loved the end results. It also made me rethink some of my other pieces and encouraged me to think outside the box that I'd placed myself and my photography inside of for many years. The success I had with

this photo re-energized me as a photographer and grew my vision of myself as an artist.

Sometimes all it takes is once. One moment that we go left instead of right, that we zig instead of always zagging. While I understand that familiarity is comfort, it can also breed contempt. Growth happens through change, and without growth, our passion and artistry will suffer.

So, push yourself to try something new this month – a new technique, a new location, a new way of looking at something – and along with everything else in springtime, let's grow!

Notable Photographers and Their Images

Dorothy Bohm - Beauty in the Most Unlikely Places

"I have spent my lifetime taking photographs. The photograph fulfills my deep need to stop things from disappearing. It makes transience less painful and retains some of the special magic which I have

looked for and found. I have tried to create order out of chaos, to find stability in flux and beauty in the most unlikely places" – Dorothy Bohm

A few times a year, I enter my photos in LensCulture competitions. LensCulture is an online photography magazine, the articles are interesting and the photos inspire me. The competitions get thousands of photos from all around the world. I don't expect to win, although one-time I got a Gallery award, which is kind of an honorable mention. The competitions give me an opportunity to review and curate my photos. I often discover a new appreciation for some of my photos and my photographic abilities. As I suspect with most photographers, I am my own harshest critic.

When one submits photos to LensCulture, there are fields for a Project Statement and an Artist Bio. For the Bio, I identify, or as now commonly used in introductions, "present myself" as a Photographer, Soccer Player and Cat Houseboy. I am not sure what to put in the Project Statement section. I try to be direct and avoid faux-grandiose statements. Recently, I have been leaving that section blank.

I attended a photography webinar regarding creating Statements of Intent. It was really well done and the presenter provided a road map of how to create one. I started to write mine, but then

abandoned it. I realized I was not really sure of my "Intent" when I pointed my camera at something.

Dorothy Bohm was born in 1924 in Konigsberg, a city in what was then East Prussia. At 14, her parents sent her to London to avoid persecution as they were Jewish. Her father gave her his Leica camera as a parting gift. That inadvertently started her journey as a world-traveling photographer. Amazingly, her parents survived, but she would not see them for 20 years.

After two years in the London Blitz, she moved to Manchester to study photography at the Manchester College of Technology. Her intent was to make a living, to survive the war, become a photographer and have a family. She had her own

studio by the age of 21. She had a family, visited 32 countries and published 20 books and had 26 shows of her photos. Pretty impressive for a 14 year-old refugee with only a suitcase and Leica camera.

She took this self portrait when she was 18.

Her quote at the beginning of this article made me reflect on why I take photos. I realized I also take pictures to stop the things from disappearing, specifically my memories. Perhaps that is my intent, to store moments of my life in my photos.

The technological advances in photography over the last few decades have been amazing. We have instantaneous access to photos via our digital cameras and our computers. I use Google Photos to store and curate my photos. The site has some great features, one of which is face and object recognition. The system auto-magically creates distinct collections of individuals and objects. The collections are smart, you can, but don't need to curate them manually. You can also do ad-hoc searches, recently I searched for "blue building Oakland" to find a specific image in my collection of 20,000 photos. The system has a favorite feature and a big choice of global filters. Recently, Google introduced smart and manual erasure, you can selectively remove objects from your photos. The system is free, but you have to pay for additional storage which only costs \$20 a year. Quite the bargain.

By the late 1950s, Bohm had moved away from studio work to street photography. She took this image of workers in the Notting Hill section of London in the 1960s.

Bohm said she sought "beauty in the most unlikely places" – this image of what looks like workers drinking a beer or ale during a break seems to be one.

Do you find this image interesting? If so, what makes it interesting to you?

To me, it is a visual time capsule of a once common occurrence – workers drinking beer on the job. Historically, beer has been a food product. It provided needed calories and safe liquid when food was scarce and water contaminated. Of course, by the 20th century, beer drinking had become a social phenomenon in pub-oriented Great Britain. People still regularly go to their local pub for a drink between work and home.

I wondered about the occupation of these two men. I don't think they are painters, their shoes are not painter shoes. Perhaps they are sign hangers. Note the pencil behind one man's ear and the cigarette and tie on the other. This was a time when blue-collar laborers still wore ties. Notice how the ladders add direction and a bit of tension to the image.

Bohm traveled the world with her camera and lived to be 98. She died in March 2023. Here is obituary in The Guardian – https://www.theguardian.com/artanddesign/2023/mar/27/dorothy-bohm-obituary

Lastly, why are you a photographer?

Take a crack at writing a Statement of Intent for your photography. Let me know if you create one, I would be interested in seeing it. If it resonates with me, maybe I can steal it.

Stab from the Past

An occasional informal history of the Northern California Council of Camera Clubs, ripped from the pages of Foto Fanfare

1979

In January, N4C began discussing adding Photojournalism and Photo Travel Divisions. In February, the Oakland Camera Club proposed a bylaws change to start a Photo Travel Division. In March the Bylaws committee recommended a 1 year trial period for photojournalism and photo travel to see how many participated. A bylaws change was made in November adding PhotoJournalism

and Photo Travel.
There were two levels
A and AA.
Competitions were to
be held on odd months
of the year.

Foto Fanfare recommends using a white or black cloth made of 100% polyester as a background. It won't wrinkle and has enough body to hang flat from shelves or a clothesline. You can eliminate residual wrinkles in the image by illuminating the white backdrop from the rear and making sure it is out of focus.

One thing N4C did in the 70's and before was to keep track of "Club Standings" based on images receiving awards at N4C Interclub competitions. The results were posted in Foto Fanfare.

In 1979 the divisions were Color Slides, Prints, Nature, and Stereo. Within the Print Division there were subdivisions and levels: Salon, Advanced, Amateur, and

MiniPrint (all B&W), as well as Color A and Color B. The Color Slide division had levels B, A, AA and AAA.

A seminar on judging photojournalism images took place at the Dominican Sisters Convent in Fremont on February 24th from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM. Cost was \$5.00.

Two copies of the Bylaws were given to each club. Additional copies were available at 75 cents each.



The editor of Foto Fanfare urged members to solicit advertisements for the magazine. As a result, several new companies started advertising. Still missing are the full-page ads by a major camera store, a feature of every issue prior to 1978.

Oakland Camera Club arranged a bus trip to Mono lake, Bodie and Yosemite on Jun 8-10th. Cost was \$91.00.

Foto Fanfare reports someone converting a kitchen funnel into a lens shade.

FotoClave was held at the Oakland Hyatt House

on October 20-21st. Presentations included stereo photography of the High Sierras, Poland Today, The Galapagos, Alaska Mountains, Posterization Made Easy, Manipulation of Prints, Cameras Don't Take Pictures, Photo Kinks, and The Photography of Glenn A. Baum. There was also a model shoot and photo exhibitions. Speaker's Notes were available at \$1.50/copy.

N4C Portfolio Competition

What is an N4C Portfolio?

An N4C Portfolio is a sequence of between 7 and 10 photographs that explore a *theme*, which may be a concept, subject, or relationship. These photographs are preceded by an image containing the text of your Statement of Intent and are followed by an Overview Image containing thumbnails of your images in the order they are to be viewed.

Why should I participate in this competition?

Creating a portfolio provides an opportunity for you to express your personal photographic style, process, and interests. In a portfolio you are free to create images that can only be understood in the context of other images and may require contemplation to appreciate. The competition provides recognition for photographers who create images in a style that may not fit with traditional camera club competitions. It gives you an excuse to enjoy again photographs you have already taken or provides motivation to go out a take more photos!

How is a portfolio assessed?

Three assessors will review your portfolio. They will evaluate the portfolio based on the following questions (in order of importance): (1) Does the work represent a cohesive theme as expressed in the Statement of Intent? (2) How well does the portfolio *taken as a whole* achieve the photographer's intent? (3) How well are the individual images executed in the context of the photographer's intent?

Everyone who enters will receive a video of the assessors' discussion of your portfolio (including arguments among themselves!) with useful suggestions. Winning portfolios will be shown at the Annual Awards Celebration.

How do I get started?

A good place to start is by watching the video *N4C Portfolios – Everything You Wanted to Know*, available on the N4C YouTube channel at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=OHK3tmlwpmY. Note: the description of this video includes a table of contents, so if you want to revisit a specific topic, you can jump right to it.

How do I enter?

Gather your Statement of Intent image, the 7 to 10 images comprising the body of your portfolio and your Overview Image as JPEGs in the same format as any entry to a club competition. If your club uses a photoclubservice.com website to manage their competitions, the club will have created a local club portfolio competition. Submit your portfolio to that competition as you would any sequence. For information on creating and submitting a sequence, see https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=n_P8FFUrtzo. Check with your club for details such as open and closing dates. If your club does not use photoclubservice.com, check with your club for instructions. The N4C Portfolio Competition closes on November 1st at 11:59 PM, so your club competition will close before that.

Where can I get additional information?

Start by reading the official rules. Go to https://N4C.org, hover over "Competitions" and click on "Portfolio Competition Rules". You can also check out the documents on https://N4C.PhotoClubServices.com. Please do not login to this site, just hover your cursor over "Organization" and click on "Documents and Files to Download". Click on the small triangle next to 4.0 Interclub Competition and Judging, then the triangle next to 4.G Instructional Material for Club Members. There you will find several useful documents. You can view previous years' winners on the N4C YouTube channel at https://bit.ly/N4CYouTube (capitalization matters) as well as videos on creating a Statement of Intent and an Overview Image.

Have fun creating your portfolio. I look forward to seeing your portfolio in the competition!

Visit while you can: America's best place to view photography to close.

Pier 24 Photography in San Francisco is arguably the best place to view photography in America. It is huge. At 27,000 square feet it may be the largest photography gallery in the world. Inside, the space is divided into a number of interconnected galleries, typically each gallery is devoted to a body of work by a single photographer. Importantly, an appointment is required and the number of visitors in the space at any one time is strictly limited. You will have over two hours to wander through the exhibition, spending as much time with each photograph as you like, undisturbed by other visitors. And admission is free. Reservations can be made on the gallery's website https://pier24.org/.

Unfortunately, a dispute over rent between the gallery's owner, the Pilara Foundation, and the Port of San Francisco, which owns the building, has caused the Foundation to announce they are closing the gallery. The Foundation will no longer fund gallery exhibits. However, you still have time to visit; the current lease expires in July 2025.

The current exhibit, Looking Forward: Ten Years of Pier 24 Photography, highlights a selection of photographers collected by the Pilara Foundation over the past decade. With a focus on single artist galleries, Looking Forward demonstrates the Gallery's belief that exhibiting photographers' works in depth is the best way to communicate their visions for a given project or moment in time.

Other Places to View Photography

Many of the art galleries and museums in the Bay Area occasionally exhibit photography, but the following deal (almost) exclusively with photography.

- Chung 24 Gallery, 4071 24th Street, San Francisco. San Francisco's newest gallery dedicated to photography. Located in Noe Valley, the gallery's program seeks to nurture emerging talent, to make art accessible, to foster conversations and help tell the story behind each artist's body of work.
- Fraenkel Gallery, 49 Geary St, San Francisco. Exhibits focus on established photographers.
- Robert Koch Gallery, 49 Geary St, San Francisco. Exhibits focus on significant new artists and lesser-researched frontiers in the history of the medium, while offering the finest examples by established masters of photography.
- <u>Euqinom Gallery</u>, 1295 Alabama Street, San Francisco. Exhibits focus on emerging and mid-career contemporary artists. The gallery presents multidisciplinary work that expands the boundaries of photo-based practices.
- Harvey Milk Photography Center, 50 Scott Street, San Francisco. Exhibits focus on newer photographers and amateurs. It also operates the oldest and largest community wet darkroom in the United States
- <u>SF Camerawork</u>, Fort Mason Center, 2 Marina Blvd, Building A, San Francisco. A launching pad for new photographer's careers. Promotes diversity in the arts.
- <u>Scott Nichols Gallery</u>, 450 1st Street East, Suite G, Sonoma Square, Sonoma. The gallery houses one of the largest private collections of Brett Weston photographs as well as an extensive inventory of photographs by classic California photographers such as Ansel Adams, Edward Weston, Dorothea Lange, Imogen Cunningham, Ruth Bernhard, Wynn Bullock, and William Garnett.
- <u>Center for Photographic Art</u>, At the Sunset Center, 9th and San Carlos, Carmel-by-the-Sea. This is the second-oldest members' photography gallery in the country. A bit further afield, combine a trip to Carmel or Big Sur with a visit to this gallery.
- Oakland Photo Workshop & Gallery, 312 8th St, Oakland. Operated by the East Bay Photo Collective to support local photographers.
- 6th on 7th Gallery, 105 7th Street, San Francisco. A community art space in the South of Market Neighborhood of San Francisco, where adults living below the poverty line and military veterans may learn the skills of photography and partake in projects designed to provide a creative outlet.
