#### President's Corner

I recently returned from Antarctica, and I can tell you that it was no vacation. Instead, I really feel like I was an explorer who survived an adventure.

Just getting to the launching off point in Ushuaia, Argentina (the southern-most city on the planet) was a 48-hour ordeal (changing planes, delays, missed connections, long taxi rides back and forth between airports, etc.) that made us fearful, at one point, that we might miss our ship. We made it to the ship on time, but I have never traveled by ship before (except for day trips on boats). Yet, I had the audacity to book

a trip on the smallest ship that goes to Antarctica – an old Russian research vessel that has been converted for adventure travelers – to travel across the Drake Passage. If you are not familiar with the Drake Passage, it is apparently the body of water that instills fear even in sailors and has been called the most dreaded bit of ocean on the planet. We learned the terms Drake Lake and Drake Shake. We hoped for one...we got the other. After traveling there, someone sent me a link to a CNN article about the Drake Passage entitled "Like Going to the Moon': The World's Most Terrifying Ocean Crossing". No sh\*t!



That said, in between Drake Passage was an extraordinary exploration of...Antarctica(!), the most remote, least inhabited continent on Earth. This is where being on a small ship with only 47 passengers paid off. Except for the beginning and the end of our time there, we never saw another ship, and we all were able to go out twice a day for several hours at a time for landings and Zodiac explorations in areas that the bigger ships cannot go. Glaciers and rugged mountains, icebergs with



so many different shapes and sizes and patterns, whales, seabirds, seals, and lots and lots of penguins. We visited breeding colonies of Chinstrap, Gentoo, and Adelie penguins at various stages (building nests, sitting on eggs, feeding chicks) depending on the latitude at the time. We took Zodiac rides amongst icebergs and brash ice (a new term for me) that were truly magical.

Surprisingly, it was not terribly cold while we were there. Of course, January is summertime, but the temperatures were generally in the 30s, which is not bad if you're used to places like Tahoe. We were also fortunate that it was just cold enough for it to snow instead of rain the few days there was precipitation.

Bottom line is that even though there were many challenges traveling to and from Antarctica, those challenges will likely be a bit like childbirth – as time passes, the challenges will fade, and we'll just think about the end result: an extraordinary adventure to the remote bottom of the world.

The grandeur and uniqueness, the quiet and isolation, the thousands of penguins – these were things to be experienced first-hand in this trip of a lifetime. Plus, now I have bragging rights - bonus!

#### Notable Photographers and Their Images

#### Fred Lyon - The Dreamer

"I see pictures I would like to take, I need another lifetime to photograph San Francisco. But my life has been so much fun I can't believe it. I keep thinking I'm being softened up for something really grim. And it hasn't happened yet." – Fred Lyon (1924 - 2022)

I lived in North Beach for 15 years. I had a third floor apartment in a post-1906 earthquake Edwardian on Kearny near Union. It had killer

views, a large parking space and was rent-controlled. Cha-ching! I used to walk to work at Charles Schwab and Wells Fargo. I recall reading that at that time only three percent of Americans could walk to work; I was very happy to be one of them. My apartment was one block from Coit Tower. I could see Coit Tower from the bay window when I sat in my living room. The apartment was small, but I was living large in the city of my dreams.

Fred Lyon took this image of Coit Tower looking down Castle Street. Castle was a small alley off Union Street near the top of Telegraph Hill. I recall it only being two blocks long. There was a laundromat on the corner where I used to wash my clothes. I walked by this alley with my laundry a few times every month. I always noticed this view, but I never thought to take a picture. I wasn't serious about photography; I rarely took my cheap camera with me. This is something that would not happen in the age of the iPhone when

everyone has a camera in their pocket. Everything is a photo opportunity, including a plate of food in front of you.

Fred Lyon was born in San Francisco in 1924. He got his first camera when he was 12. He joined the navy after the attack on Pearl Harbor. The navy made him a military photographer, probably because he knew how to work a camera and develop film. This shows how a decision made when you are young can set you on your path in life. In this case, it was Lyon taking up the hobby of photography as a boy which led him to becoming a famous photographer. When I was twelve, my



hobby was raising tropical fish in a suburb of Buffalo. It was fun, but I am not really sure how that influenced my life path. I don't do anything with fish now except eat them.

After the war, Lyon moved to New York and became a successful commercial photographer. He and his wife moved back to San Francisco where he continued his photographic love affair with the city. He documented the city and its people for the rest of his life. He took this picture of kids playing on Kearny Street in 1952.



Let's investigate the photo. Jot your answers on the back of a soon-to-be discarded used envelope.

- 1. What are your initial thoughts?
- 2. What emotion does it evoke?
- 3. What does this image mean to you?
- 4. Who is the subject? What is the theme?
- 5. What is that guy doing on the curb? Does he add or distract from the story?

This game looks both fun and dangerous. I suspect they took turns sliding down the hill. Note how the perpendicular alleyway in the background draws you into the image. The sitting guy is daydreaming while taking in an expansive view of San Francisco's downtown and its southern neighborhoods. Perhaps he is on a lunch break. I too used to daydream as I walked up and down this street.

When this picture was taken in 1952, North Beach was still a blue-collar working class neighborhood. The area had been destroyed in the 1906 Earthquake and Fire but was quickly rebuilt over the next two decades. It was where Joe DiMaggio and his brothers learned how to play baseball. The weather was better than many other parts of the city.

I showed this photo to a few of my Spanish teachers and we talked about the image in Spanish. It reminded them of childhood and they mentioned nostalgia.

I know exactly where these kids are. This is a steep part of Kearny Street just above Broadway that leads up to my aforementioned apartment, which is two blocks up this hill. The theme of childhood and nostalgia is obvious in the photo. But I didn't think of childhood. I was in my 30s and 40s when I lived in North Beach. By that time, a lot of young professionals had moved in, me being one of them. The working class families and Beatniks were gone, replaced by Yuppies and tourists. It was now an adult playground of coffee houses, restaurants, and bars.

Lyon took many images like this of San Francisco. He was living large in the city of his dreams. He died in 2022 at the age of 97.

And, lastly, a cat update.

We got a new cat. I wasn't planning on it, it just kinda happened.

Two months ago, I stopped by the Alameda animal shelter to help with the laundry. I visited the cat room. As usual, there were some nice cats, but I noticed a small cat in a corner cage and asked about her. The volunteer told me she had a neurological problem and had difficulty walking. When I put my hand in the cage, she licked it. That sealed the deal. I decided to take her home and see if we could add her to our family.


The cat has Cerebral Hypoplasia (CH). It is caused by a virus that attacks the kitten's brain while her mother is gestating. The virus damages the neurons that coordinate movement. When I got her home, she swayed when she walked and fell over every three or four steps. Slippery surfaces were a no-go for her; she can't do them. We bought some large rugs to cover the white oak floors on our second floor. That helped immensely. We have been making other accessibility adjustments to our house with pet ramps and such. We named her Floppy.

Floppy gets lots of attention and exercise. She has gotten much stronger and falls much less often. Most importantly, she is great with the litter box and gets along with our other cats. Fortunately, she is not in pain, the disease is not progressive and our lifestyle is a good match with her needs. She should live a long cat life.

Floppy is super social. She hangs out in the office while I do my Spanish lessons and I play with her during my breaks. She bites my toes if I don't give her enough attention. Recently she has been strong enough to explore the rest of the house and terrorize our other cats with her desire to play. We officially adopted her a few weeks ago. Here is a video of her walking.

#### Stab from the Past

An occasional informal history of the Northern California Council of Camera Clubs, ripped from the pages of Foto Fanfare

Curated by Doug Stinson

#### 1992

On January 25<sup>th</sup> N4C presented a seminar on "How to Recognize a Good Photographic image and Understand Why" or "Do the Judges Need Glasses?". This was a seminar for all members who would like to know how judges judge. It was also designed for members who want to become judges. Cost was \$5.00.

The "Basic" competition level was renamed "Amateur" to be consistent across Divisions. Self-Made Color Advanced became Self-Made Color Salon and a new Self-Made Color Advanced level added. Nature, Sequence, Travel, and Journalism could be color or monochrome.

N4C was asked to add an AAA level to Nature Slides, an AAA level to Travel Slides, an AA level to Journalism, and splitting Contemporary into A and B sub-levels. Prints continue to be divided into "selfmade" and "Commercially made" divisions.

President Les Harrington writes "Telling clubs what to do has never been part of [N4C's] charter and is not going to be in the future."

Some members who make their own prints complained that allowing commercially made prints "opened the door to buying awards by those willing to spend a lot of money". It was pointed out that a print made at Long's Drug Store recently took first place in interclub competition.

The editor of Foto Fanfare, Joan Field, writes "No, the *Fanfare* editorial is not a conspiracy to strongarm N4C members into changing their ways." She added a "Letters to the Editor" column to Foto Fanfare.

Notice for the Democratic and Republican conventions this year: "Do not photograph speakers when they are addressing the audience. Shoot them just before they begin to talk."

N4C added "Contemporary" to the list of "Special Prints" along with Travel, Journalism, Nature, and Sequence. Previously Contemporary was only for slides.

Karen McClymonds of the Livermore Camera Club was awarded the Bronze Medal in the United Nations Environmental Program Photo Contest. Her photo was titled "A tragedy of Gill Net Fishing – California Sea Lion".

In an editorial, Joan Field writes: "To prevent the creative individual from leaving the club...the club needs to open its arms to more personal styles and give outlet to less circumscribed methods. Let's try squeezing in special in-house competitions that encourage members to present their less competitive, but perhaps, more interesting work. Let's use judges who have a variety of backgrounds, even artists who have never held a camera."

"In my case, photography is an outstanding excuse to go somewhere and enjoy myself trying to see things differently that others have before." – Les Harrington, N4C President

N4C tried a competition with cash awards. The category was Pictorial and there was an entry fee of \$1.00 per slide. 50% of the entry fees were set aside as prize money. First place received 50% of the prize money, second place 30% and 3<sup>rd</sup> place 20%. There were 108 entries.

Joan Field wrote a review of Kodak's Photo CD process [Interesting to me as I worked on that while at Kodak – DGS].

Because of the inability to find volunteers N4C eliminated then position of 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President. This

also meant that the old three-year commitment of 2<sup>nd</sup> VP->1<sup>st</sup> VP-> President was eliminated, and being president was only a one year commitment.

Foto Fanfare took 6<sup>th</sup> place in then PSA International Bulletin Competition (Councils Division).



Creative Winner: Sunrise Flight Over the Trees

This image captivates the viewer's attention as it provides movement, energy, warmth and color flow. Yet one rests within it. The use of vertical and horizontal lines keeps the eyes moving through the image. The sun provides a resting place, as it is the focal point. The flight of the pelicans adds a different direction of movement, adding more interest. The shapes mimic and support each other, especially the vertical and horizontal triangular lines against the triangularity of the trees. There's a good balance of light and dark tones, and the use of similar colors gives the image an overall comfort of harmony. It's like a puzzle has been exquisitely built from a structure of color and design.

Journalism Winner: Sri Lanka Tea Production


This series of four images tells a complete story of tea production by women in Sri Lanka. The first image shows an overview of the colorful warehouse and the large, heavy bags of tea. A worker looks directly into the camera with eyes that say more than words could. The next image takes us directly to the field at large (each title is also descriptive and informative to the viewer). The third image takes the viewer back inside and adds an important element - motion, a visual stimulus. The women are engaged in their work, ignoring the photographer. The series concludes with the final journey, not only about the tea needing to be weighed, but also about the cost to the physical and financial health of these workers.

Pictorial Winner: Bee Pollinating Passion Fruit flower

The luminosity (use of light against dark) of this image is exquisite. In addition, there are many fine, in-focus details to study: the tendrils, the petals, the bee. The background is sufficiently blurred to provide a steady backdrop to the flower. Purple and green are complementary colors, which adds boldness to the image.
