President's Corner

Earlier this month, I attended a concert that was billed as a multisensory experience at the San Francisco Symphony. The orchestra performed a piece that also included coordinated lights and an olfactory aspect designed by a Cartier perfumer. My husband loved it and felt it all enhanced the experience. I, however, felt that the lights and puffs of perfume triggered at defined times were distracting and detracted from the music. ART. People experience things differently. That is, I believe, part of the point.

What I did find fascinating was how many "young" people were in the audience that night. Some of their comments I overheard centered around their idea that this was a fresh, more modern approach to tired old music. Ironically, though, Scriabin, who composed the piece, apparently wrote it with notes to make it a multi-sensory experience more than a hundred years ago. So, not a new idea, just one using current technology.

This made me think of a couple comments that a young guy, who signed up for FotoClave through Meetup, made about "Boomers" needing to let go of old ideas and embrace modernity in photography, specifically AI, AI, AI. I felt like saying, in my best Granny Clampett impression, "Sure, sonny!"

A few days later, I attended a "photography" webinar on AI. The presenter gushed over his obsession with "creating" things using Midjourney's generative AI programming. He showed example after example of "artwork" created by Midjourney after giving it a few words as a prompt. It was amazing to see the variations, quality, and creativity that Midjourney's pieces exhibited. He was even excited about some of the "surprising" end results.

However, when the presenter kept referring to the generated art as his, it didn't sit right with me. An artist is, as I see it, the visionary who uses his/her skill to create a specific piece of art. Given that, a few descriptive words as a prompt does <u>not</u> make a piece of art. Midjourney, in this case, was the visionary for how to interpret those words, and Midjourney was the creator of the specific resulting art pieces. By definition, that makes Midjourney the artist.

The webinar also really solidified for me that artwork created by generative AI is <u>not</u> photography. It is a completely new, and separate type of art, just as photography was/is different from watercolors or oil paintings.

Assistive AI, however, is a separate thing. Unfortunately, I think that generative AI and assistive AI get linked because of the use of AI in both terms. However, they are very different in their process and their end result. Assistive AI is the technology that allows for all of us to take our photographs and adjust or enhance them to varying degrees.

We, as the artists, can use these tools to whatever extent we choose to apply them to our original photography to fulfill our final vision of our creation. It still means that I will, in the end, decide what rules of composition to use (or ignore), what levels/type of color to apply or enhance, along with the depth of field, lighting, texture, clarity, etc. Frankly, I'm just thrilled that assistive AI allows me to dodge and burn like Ansel Adams did (among other things), but without needing to have expert skills in the darkroom. This is a good reminder that, on a basic level, a lot of what assistive AI allows us to do is the kind of adjustments and enhancements that were first developed (pun intended) in the darkroom.

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These are not new ideas, just new implementations using current technologies.

Certainly, as the technologies develop further, along with our knowledge and use of them, there are bound to be some overlapping uses of generative and assistive AI, resulting in potentially contentious gray areas in their use. I am not here to debate those things. Over the next few months, however, we will have a committee reviewing the language and guidelines in the N4C competition rules to make recommendations for clarifying the use of AI in our photography competitions. Stay tuned.

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Notable Photographers and Their Images

André Kertész - Memory Maker

"Everybody can look but they don't necessarily see" - André Kertész (1894-1985)

I have been listening to Alan Watts podcasts recently. He was many things to many people, but he described himself as an "entertainment philosopher". I listen to his lectures on my iPhone, often as I lie in my bed, getting ready to enter the world of sleep. I don't understand all of his teachings, but I find them soothing. It is a great gift when someone can create a

soothing experience that can be shared with others. I think the photographer André Kertész had that ability.

What are your thoughts of this André Kertész image of a fork and plate? Does it evoke any memories? Have you taken images like this?

I recall seeing this

doesn't generate creativity.

photograph a few years ago. The image is simple, but it had a deep impact on me. I replicated this image a few times, in cafes and more recently in my kitchen in Alameda. My attempts didn't generate the same energy or wonder as when I saw the original. Perhaps my compositions were flawed, but I suspect it was because duplicates don't have the same evocative power as an original experience. It

Of course, copying a technique is a good way to improve your ability with a camera. But in

the end, you have to pair techniques with something new if you want to get that mental spark of achieved creativity. And isn't that what we are looking for when we venture out with our cameras?

Notice how there is no food in the image. We have the tools for eating, but no food. The image is as much about absence and anticipation as it is about presence. How would the image occur if there was a half-eaten

pastry with some of its crumbs on the plate?

From a compositional perspective, I find the shadows most striking. They accentuate the geometry of the physical objects and are beautifully composed. I don't think I noticed this characteristic when I tried to duplicate the image. As referenced by Kertész's quote: I



looked, but did not see.

Now for a twist. This image has been called "Fork, Paris, 1928".

How does this title affect your experience of the image?

Does it create a more or less impactful experience?

The title greatly changes my experience of the image.

One of my favorite writers is Ernest Heminway. He and other artists of the Lost Generation lived in Paris in the 1920s. I am fascinated by this period and what was happening in Paris. The image made me think of the time they spent in cafes, drinking and eating and discussing art and life. The world was broken and alienated by the Great War and they were putting it back together with their ideas and creations. The image brings my thoughts to Paris in the 1920s. I can see the table where this fork and plate are. I can hear sounds and voices of a busy cafe.

André Kertész was in Paris in the 1920s. He was born in Budapest in 1894. He bought his first camera in 1912. He was self-taught and focused on what would eventually be called Street Photography. He served in the Austro-Hungarian army in World War One and was wounded. He moved to Paris in 1925 and had his first solo show in 1927. He and his wife emigrated to New York City in 1936 to escape the growing terror created by the Nazis.

In New York, Kertész found work taking pictures for magazines, including Vogue, Harper's Bazaar, and Condé Nast. But, he lamented the loss of his community of friends in Paris, including many fellow Hungarians. Paris was now a memory. Here is another quote by Kertész.

"The most valuable things in a life are a man's memories. And they are priceless" -André Kertész (1894-1985)

Kertész took this picture in Martinique in 1972.

This image is like an old memory, it persists, but lacks the complete detail. No doubt, like many of us, Kertész used his camera to capture his memories. That is the magic of the camera, it is a time travel machine. I get those "Oh, I remember that..." moments when I look at my old photos.

Kertész established himself as one of the photographic titans of the 20th century. He died in his sleep at his home in New York City in 1985



The N4C President Henry Washauer's message in January included an excerpt from Compuserve Magazine: "Digital photography is here – to stay". The article continues "Sam Merrell... who teaches at the New York School of Visual Arts, used a Dycam Model 1 camera in this imaging class...The photos, he says, are "a lot better than the drugstore prints you used to get from a Kodak Brown ie, and you can make the prints on a laser printer."

Print competitions were hosted by clubs, with participation by members of that and nearby clubs. According to Print Chair Dick Schneider "we got to see what other makers were doing, what other clubs were doing, and we got to know people from other clubs".



Joan Field opines "Although it may be some time before digitized in-camera photography will be of high enough quality to compete with film, it is with anticipation that we await each new development. By focusing on these new areas of photography we cry out that we are not stuck in our ways and are willing to investigate what's new and exciting."

N4C hosted FotoClave this year. The conference was held at the Concord Hilton on November 5. 6. & 7th. It included a 3-hour presentation titled "Seeing Deeply" by Dewitt Jones Friday evening. Winning prints were on continuous display and winning slides shown on Sunday. Kodak gave a demonstration of their computer program for enhancing slide. The banguet Saturday evening featured James Paradise and his program "Images of Paradise". Other topics were Wildlife photography, Ideas and Methods for Creative Photography, Macro: Step Beyond Reality, Mylar Magic, New Black and White Processing Techniques, and History of Stereo Photography.

Because there were few entries in the Commercially made Black and White Print category, this was combined with the Selfmade category in the Amateur and Advanced levels. Salon level Black and White prints continue to be self-made only.

"Every month the [N4C] Council meets, not only to accept entries, but also to discuss photography. For example, questions that are on the horizon are: computerized slides and prints, laser prints, CD ROM technology. Shall we not discuss these because we do not want to accept new technology? Let us not let the world pass us by." – Henry Washauer

Thoughts on the value of FotoClave

After many years of going to business conferences all over the country, I expected that by 2pm each day of the FotoClave conference, I'd be found slumped in my car out in the Marriott parking lot, sleeping with a map over my face, completely exhausted but too tired to drive home. Didn't happen.

I talked my sister into flying in from New York to attend this year's FotoClave conference and surprisingly it managed to keep our interest for nearly 12 hours a day for two-and-a half days.

There were sessions and workshops I couldn't attend, but every session I did attend (except maybe one) both informed and inspired us.

The keynotes were worth the price of admission

MH Rubin set the right tone with his opening keynote presentation. I worried that his session, "The Photograph as Haiku," would be an esoteric, academic, and highly regimented way of approaching photography. Wrong again! Informed by his study of numerous mid-century photographers, Rubin's comments were inspiring. After his presentation I felt MORE empowered to break the hackneyed "rule of thirds", leading lines, etc. and find new ways to simplify and balance images. I might even buy his book, "The Photograph as Haiku"!

Scott Kelby is an engaging, down-to-earth speaker who had us laughing out loud. His tips on travel photography are useful even if you never leave the Bay area... (though I started researching Cuba as soon as I got back to my computer). Who'da thought you could use a small puddle and get down low to create an awesome reflecting pool?

From now on when I'm traveling to a new destination, I'm going to scout locations by taking the 2-hour bus tour, or I'll hire a local guide if it's affordable. I'll also take advantage of jetlag and go out at dawn to get shots of empty streets/monuments before the tourists start swarming. And sitting by the window in a restaurant and photographing your food is a great way to remember the experience.

The breadth of Frans Lanting's nature and landscape work is astounding and as a Northern California resident and photographer, he uses his prodigious talent to showcase the unique and fragile beauty of our world and inspire us to do better.

Jason Bradley did a yeoman's job, stepping in when one of the keynote speakers was unable to attend. He referenced many of the masters in his presentation, like Steiglitz, Weston, Cunningham, Adams, and more, to illustrate how to emphasize light and mood, whether you embrace Pictorialism or straight (or pure) photography. I plan to spend more time researching and reflecting on those master photographers to see how to improve my own storytelling.

Susan and Neil Silverman packed their presentation full of tips on composition and showed us many gadgets that help you visualize and capture images.

While I had played with Intentional Camera Motion (ICM), Jan Lightfoot's session took it to a new level with very useful, specific tips and examples.

Other Highlights

As I said, I couldn't go to all of the sessions, so I can only comment on those I was able to see first-hand.

Catherine Karnow was remarkable! Her approach (literally and figuratively) to photographing people involves gaining the subject's trust and creating a relationship, even if it is only for ten minutes. Where I am reluctant to speak to a stranger on the street, Karnow—in her genuinely friendly manner—goes right up to strangers and makes them comfortable enough to show their truth, with emotion and impact, largely because she honors their inherent dignity. Her photos are legendary in their ability to show real people in their natural environments, even when that environment is modest or painful. And it wasn't just about admiring her work; Karnow shared lots of tips on

Meeting Expectations

Up to now I probably sound a bit like a paid "influencer," having only good things to say. I can assure you that I paid full price and don't owe these folks anything. I got what I wanted from the conference, which is new perspectives and education that will help me do a better job of capturing mood and impact in my photos.

If you went to FotoClave to learn how to use all the tools in Lightroom, or to become an expert at any particular technique, you may have been disappointed. But if you went to get inspired or to be re-inspired, to get tips that you can start using right away, or to mingle with others who share your passion for this creative medium, I think you would judge it a success.

I was actually pleased to get *conflicting* information from different speakers; Catherine Karnow ALWAYS gets permission from subjects before photographing them while others are okay with the "stealth" method of shooting with a long lens. Several speakers dismissed some of the unwritten rules used by our N4C judges, preferring each situation and each image to be unique. Scott Kelby advises us to "go for the cliché shots" but also look for unique perspectives. This all made me happy because it encourages creativity.



On Monday after the conference closed, my sister and I were driving up 680 when we decided to take the long way home: west to Emeryville and then north on 80 and east on Alhambra Valley Rd to Martinez. This "scenic route" gave us the chance to put some of the new ideas and techniques to the test. While my sister photographed the unique friezes on the PG&E building on Christie in Emeryville, I crossed the street and tried out ICM using sidewalks, graffiti, weeds and mushrooms. We then spent an hour to drive 10 miles through misty countryside. And

instead of taking hundreds of mediocre images, we took fewer, but better shots than we would have before FotoClave.

Considering that some of us spend \$250 a month on Starbucks or on getting a good haircut, I believe FotoClave is a great value. It gives you lots of great content, curated, and digestible. So when it comes up again in two years, sign up! Your participation helps to keep our clubs and N4C going, plus it helps us build community in a world that is becoming more and more isolating.



Reasons for Winning Selections

Judge—Eric Ahrendt

Best of Show/Image of the Month—Hassan II Mosque after prayer. Its minaret is the second tallest in the world, Casablanca, Morocco

The mist that partially obscures the very tall minaret gives the whole scene an otherworldly feel. The small people emphasize just how tall the minaret is, and there are no merges between them. The portions of buildings on the sides, and the center placement of the minaret, give the image a pleasing symmetry and balance. The image as a whole ranks very high on impact, interest and composition.

Pictorial Winner—Woman and Bubbles

Fun, original, and not your typical camera club image. Bold decision to crop the woman's head, but you can still see that smile, and even though it's out of focus, you can still see and read her tattoo. She makes a great background for the sharp, colorful bubbles. Really captures the emotion of the moment.

Nature Winner—Generations. A macaque nurses her baby while an elder looks on near Ubud in Bali, Indonesia

Great image of relationships among a family group. The baby's face attracts our eye because it's lighter than its surroundings, and is framed by the other macaques. It also focuses our attention on the baby's nursing, which is the key behavior in the image. The two adults' bodies form a triangle, widest at the base, for a tight, balanced composition. The light is soft and diffused, and the defocused background doesn't compete with the animals.

Authentic Wildlife—Three-toed sloths (Bradypus variegatus) have a body adapted to hang by their limbs. They live high in the canopy of rain forests. Costa Rica

Such an exotic subject! The title highlights what's so unusual about the animal, and the photo illustrates this behavior. (It also reassures us that the photo's not upside down.) Plus, he's looking our way, so we can see his face clearly, and there's nothing else in the photo to look at but him. The light coming from the left brightens his face just enough to make it stand out. Great detail on the whole sloth.

Monochrome Winner—*Fisherman in traditional rainwear*

He's an excellent portrait subject, with a distinctive face and clothing. The light coming from the upper left highlights the rim of his hat, beard and shoulders, helping separate him from the defocused background. He's not looking at the photographer and is engaged in a natural action, which makes the photo seem unposed and authentic. Converting the image to monochrome creates a timeless feel, and keeps us focused on his bright face and the texture of his hat and rain garments.

Travel Winner—Hassan II Mosque after prayer. Its minaret is the second tallest in the world, Casablanca, Morocco

In addition to the qualities that make it Best in Show, it checks all the boxes for a Travel image, showing a characteristic feature of this location and culture. The distinctive clothes of the people in the photo add to the travel story, and it's printed at a maximum size for the vertical dimension, which makes it even more striking.

Alternate Print Division – Doors—*Door, Column, and Bike, Lucca Italy*

A door with a lot of character that hasn't led a pampered life. The column, bike, rough stone entryway, and especially the weathered wall combine to make this an environmental portrait of the door that's more effective than showing it in isolation. Soft, even lighting makes the whole scene the subject, but the darker door with a splash of color has the most visual weight.
