

Pier 24 Photography is holding its final exhibition before closing its doors permanently. If you haven't experienced this unique space for showcasing photography, you really should avail yourself of this opportunity. Located on San Francisco's Embarcadero, Pier 24 Photography provides a quiet, contemplative environment for viewing photography. Members of the public, academic institutions, and museum groups may schedule self-guided tours that last up to two hours. A limited number of people are allowed in during each time slot, so you may feel like you have the place to yourself. The current exhibition *Turning the Page* is the first exhibition that does not feature works from the Pilara Foundation collection. In The News..

In March, Alison also opened *Negative Space*, a combination gallery and rental darkroom. She says "Don't just dream about it, make it happen. Success is possible!

After all these years, people still can't label slides correctly. (Is that why they became obsolete?)

FotoClave took place in Holiday Inn Milpitas November 3-5th. Included presentations by Moose Peterson, Adobe Systems and Polaroid. Meanwhile... N4C discovers digital manipulation is not as far in the future as they thought!

A new camera club member writes "I was proud when I placed third, but then confused when I learned that the two prints which placed ahead of me had been enhanced through the use of a computer. ... It seems to me, that if photography is an art, then we should not be diluting our art by depending so much on other art forms such as computer graphics and painting to enhance it. It reminds me of bodybuilders who use steroids. ... Maybe I'm naïve, but it seems to me, at the very least, we should have some divisions in our competition for pictures created by using only film, camera and lens."





Lon Overacker of the Livermore club says now is the time to jump on the Internet. He particularly recommends the *Kodak Photography Forum* on America On Line (AOL). He finds many famous nature photographers chatting in the Nature Forum. He used the forum to organize a trip to Yosemite involving 25 photographers from all over the country. They received the red-carpet treatment from the director of public relations for Yosemite Concession Services. (Ah, those sweet, naïve, early years of the Internet!)

Foto Fanfare editor Kitty Angel, having just completed a class in the technique, chimes in "Should a hand-colored photo be judged against a color print?"

President Brooks opines "Is photography an art? Absolutely. Is it 'diluted' by using techniques to enhance it? I don't think so. ...if creativity is stifled, the art suffers. ... I'm sure the majority of amateur photographers in N4C do not use computers in their work, and I have seen magnificent images produced consistently by them. ... Don't worry so much about the other fellow's work...follow your own vision."

The San Carlos Camera Club took a different approach. They created two "Other" print categories to accommodate computer enhancement, digital imaging, etc. and things like photograms, "instead of waiting to be dragged kicking and screaming into the 21st Century." "Placing [computer enhanced] work into competition with conventional photography is extremely unfair, and unfair competition is no competition. Let us bear in mind that we are still in camera clubs."

Notable Photographers and Their Images

Bernard Plossu - Nothing To See

"Nothing important is happening but that is precisely because a great photo doesn't necessarily have to show something important, it can be ordinary, anodyne." ~ Bernard Plossu

I had a motorcycle accident last month. The cycle skidded on some old train tracks in Oakland and I was tossed to the pavement. I got some bad bruises and I pinched something in my back, but fortunately, I didn't get any serious injuries. I was lucky.

I don't ride my motorcycle often, I prefer to use my bicycle or one of my cars. I still have a 1985 Toyota Tercel that I bought brand new when I lived in New Orleans in the 1980s. The car won't guit. Parts don't break, they just eventually wear out from use. The driver side window was jammed so I asked my mechanics to look at it. They fixed it, but mentioned I will probably need to replace the window regulator. Forty years of rolling up and down has taken its toll. The window regulator is a mechanism inside the door that moves the window up and down, basically a collapsable cantilever with gears. I searched the web for the part; it costs over a thousand dollars for a new one, probably because they haven't made the part in many years. Fortunately, I found a used window regulator from a scrap yard in Pennsylvania, it cost \$172.50 which included shipping. Ahh, the beauty of the Internet. The car is probably not worth more than a few hundred dollars on the open market. Of course, to me, the car is priceless. I have driven across



the county and many other places including Burning Man and the Mexican Baja.

I have photos of my Tercel, they are ordinary, but are important to me. Perhaps that is how this month's photographer feels about this photo of a wall and some water. The image is from a photo book titled "The Still Hour" by Bernard Plossu. I think the body of water is the Mediterranean.

What are your thoughts on this photo? Does it speak to you?

I chose to present this photo because it is not picturesque in the conventional sense. It is a desolate and uninviting landscape. When I first saw it, it didn't speak to me. Can one relate or enjoy an image like this? Is there beauty in this image? Why is it important to Plossu?

Plossu is French and was born in Dalat, Vietnam. He has lived in the United States since the 1970s and is an established travel photographer. I have been to Dalat. It is a popular hill town and has a small replica of the Eiffel Tower. The French used it as a provincial center to escape the heat of the big cities.

When I first saw this image, I was a little taken aback. It occurred as stark and ugly. I wondered why Plossu took the image. Perhaps he was motivated by the feeling or mood he was experiencing that day. Maybe it reminded him of some place or some person. Somehow, the view spoke to him.

I looked at this image many times, wondering what I could say about it and whether it was worth writing about in this column.

Something about it was interesting, even though it isn't pretty. Eventually, I connected with it and it brought back a memory. It reminded me of when I was traveling in a long distance commuter bus across the Egyptian Western Desert in October 2001. The bus was filled with men, mostly soldiers. The only woman on the bus was a French woman. She and I were the only foreigners. She sat in the seat next to me.

The trip was eight hours and we had plenty of time to talk. She was an

experienced traveler and was a little wary of being by herself on a bus full of men. She told me she chose to sit next to me as she didn't want to be bothered. In hindsight, I find that kind of funny as my girlfriend thinks I can be very annoying.

Plossu's image reminded me of that bus ride. I hadn't thought of that woman and the desolate landscape of the desert for many years. As such, Plossu's image did evoke something in me. I think this is the power of giving a seemingly uninteresting image a chance to speak to you. As stated in his

opening quote, an image can be ordinary, it doesn't have to show something important.

I have taken plenty of ordinary photos. They probably aren't interesting to others, but they capture the feeling of a time and place in my life. Old memories surface when I look at them. Occasionally, I enter some in our club competitions. They do not do well. Ordinary photos have to be studied, like paintings in a museum, they need an opportunity to talk. It is a two-way conversation, not a monologue.

Plossu extensively traveled the American West. He took this image of what looks like teenagers climbing over a freeway fence in New Mexico in 1983.



How would this image be critiqued in one of our camera club competitions?


N4C Supports Arizona Club Starting a Portfolio Competition

In the August 2023 issue of the Photographic Society of America's *Journal*, an article titled "A Council Conducts a Portfolio Competition" appeared. It described the N4C Portfolio Competition, its purpose, implementation, and success. The PSA Journal Editor at the time, Larry Cowles, was so impressed, he decided to start an identical competition at his club, Photography West.

Larry reached out to N4C for help, and we enthusiastically agreed. We provided Larry with access to our rules and training materials. We also agreed to provide assessors for their competition, structured the same way N4C conducts its own competition.

After much work on Larry's part, the first competition took place in March with Jeff Dunn, Jane Postiglione, and Doug Stinson acting as assessors. Fifteen portfolios were submitted, and the assessors recorded detailed critiques of each as well as selecting first through fifth and five honorable mentions. Larry convened a special meeting where all critiques were shared with all the participants as a learning experience. At a separate meeting the winning portfolios were shared with all club members.

Larry reports that participants "really enjoyed the critiques and they were well received and I thank you and the others for all the work that was put into the judging and creation of the videos. ... It was a great learning experience for everyone."

Do Current N4C Rules Handle Artificial Intelligence?

The opinion of two judges

Artificial Intelligence Generated Imagery (AIGI) has the potential to change the nature of photography. But a simpler question is "how does AIGI impact competitions such as those run by N4C and camera clubs?" N4C competitions are designed to help people improve their skills within certain photographic styles. Those styles need to be defined by rules. The rules need to put all competitors on an even playing field, with skill being the major determining factor. AIGI is a new and immediate challenge to meeting the objectives of our competitions.

N4C currently has a committee examining the current rules and perhaps re-writing them, with special attention to the impact of AIGI. But what do we do in the meantime? We believe the current rules provide adequate guidance, provided we make one, clarifying interpretation.

The Primary Governing Rule

In the current N4C Competitions rules, the Division Definition preamble, which applies to *all* divisions (section 2.1.1.a.i) states that ...

"All images submitted for competition in both Print and Projected image formats and in all competition Divisions shall originate as photographs **created** by the entrant **on a light sensitive material or device**."

Images that were *wholly* generated as a result of prompts and/or other means of AIGA processes fail to meet this requirement so, by this definition, are not submittable images.

The Second Governing Rule

Preamble section 2.1.1.1.ii states:

... No clip art, **digital art,** other graphic elements or photographs, other than those made by the entrant, may be used in whole or in part in any portion of the image."

Where does AI generated images fall in this rule? We believe the simplest interpretation is to consider it "digital art".

Section 2.1.1.1.ii also states:

"By virtue of submitting an entry, the photographer certifies that every element of the image is **his/her own work**..."

According to the US Patent and Trademark Office, neither the maker or the programs utilized are deemed to have created this output, so neither uniquely owns the product or can copyright the results. Under this definition AIGI is not the maker's own work.

We believe it is impractical to apply this definition to our competitions. As AI becomes more and more integrated into our editing tools, one may be using AI without realizing it. The use of "Content Aware Fill" has been uncontroversial for years. The "Remove Tool" seems to be just a more effective version. Should its use be banded because it is based on AI technology? This seems unreasonable. And so we propose the following clarifying interpretation:

For the purposes of the N4C competitions, when a maker uses AIGI processes to generate content, it shall be considered the "maker's own work".

This is not the first time N4C declared certain graphic elements not technically created by the maker to be allowed. In the case of fonts, the N4C Board declared the use of the Type Tool to be the maker's own work.

This may seem to open the floodgates to the use of AIGI, except for:

The Third Governing Rule

The extent such non-photographic content is allowed is currently covered within the current 2024 N4C Interclub Competition Rules, as the Division Definition preamble (section 2.1.1.a.iii) states that

"... When Divisions allow graphic elements other than photographs to be used in an image, photographic content must still predominate."

The extent that this non-photographic content is acceptable must be interpreted through this lens. If the AIGI content predominates or is predominate in an image, it is not allowed.

Furthermore, this new non-photographic content is only allowed within divisions that allow it (such as the Pictorial, Monochrome and Creative divisions) and not in Divisions that exclude it (Nature, Journalism and Travel).





Conclusion

These considerations are not new to N4C competitions. For several years we have been dealing with how to allow processes that introduce non-photographic elements, or elements that are not the maker's own work.

For example, we have already dealt with how to address the following elements:

- a.Sky replacements
- b. Texture addition
- c.User created graphic elements
- d.The use of some Photoshop Brushes and Filters

The content generated by AIGI is but another type of non-photographic element that our rules can address.

Finally, enforcement of these rules again rests primarily with the maker, and their fidelity in adhering to these requirements. It is not up to the Judges to enforce these requirements as it may not be possible to distinguish when AIGI process' have been used.

This remains the case with most all of the N4C Interclub Competition Rules.

Finally let's remember that this discussion is confined to situations where content (pixels) is being added to the image by the Artificial Intelligence. Here we are not referring to applications which use Artificial Intelligence to more effectively perform their function (such as Topaz De Noise AI).
