

Distinctive Image Featuring Joe Hearst, APSA, PPSA

The PSA Journal continues its Distinctive Image series, this time featuring Photographic Society of America (PSA) artist Dr. Joseph Hearst, APSA, PPSA, who resides in Danville, California. A very accomplished photographer, Joe shares one of his favorite subjects with us, The Innovative Image. Joe joined the Society in 1999 and within a short time became well known for his imaginative and novel approach to image taking; finding images that other photographers would ignore. In 2009 Joe earned his Proficiency Distinction (PPSA), accumulating the following star ratings: one star in the Color Projected Image and Electronic Imaging (Monochrome section) Divisions; two stars in the Photo Travel Division; and three stars in EID-Color, and small color prints. Joe competed in international PSA-recognized exhibitions for a few years, and in 2008 was first in North America (and fourth in the world) in Travel Prints in PSA's Who's Who in Photography.

Joe, who started taking photos in 1947, is a member of the Livermore Valley Camera Club

and the Contra Costa Camera Club. He is past President of the Northern California Council of Camera Clubs. He administers a study group for the Projected Image Division of the Society, is Director of the PSA Pictorial Print of the Month competition, and past Chair of the Yerba Buena Chapter of PSA.

In 2007 he was elected to the Honor of Associate of PSA (APSA). Sixteen of his articles have been published in the *PSA Journal*, and two portfolios have been published in the British magazine *Digital Photo Art*. In 2009 he received the *Charles Keaton Memorial Award* in recognition of his *Journal* publications. In 2012 he passed the PSA course *Judging and Analysis Beyond the Rules* to improve his judging technique. He made a presentation, *Rust, Rubbish, and Reflections* at the PSA 2008 Annual Conference. He also received the Meritorious Service Award in 2008 and the Commendation Service Award in 2006 from the Pictorial Print Division.

In December 2012 Joe had a one man show

at the Lindsay Dirkx Brown Art Gallery in San Ramon, California, depicting how the people of Cuba are able to create a vibrant culture in the ruins of once-magnificent surroundings; how the people of the Luberon, a region of Provence, have preserved the ambiance of their colorful, historic villages; and how the town of Oaxaca, in Mexico, has been kept vibrant while retaining its ancient charm. He also showed the colorful decay of Fort Point, in San Francisco.

Joe is retired from the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory where he worked as a physicist for 35 years. Towards the end of his career he worked mainly in geophysical well logging. He was a founder and past President of the Minerals and Geotechnical Logging Society. He is senior author of the book *Well Logging for Physical Properties*.







#### **Artist's Statement**



I am retired from the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory where I worked as a physicist for 35 years. I started making photos and using the darkroom in about 1947, and after retirement I took up serious photography and joined some camera clubs. When I started in serious photography I went the usual route. I made pictures, took them to my camera


club, got critiques, and slowly improved. I photographed the usual subjects, like sunsets, the Golden Gate Bridge, mountain lakes, wildlife, and famous buildings, and accumulated a number of awards.

Then one day I went to a talk by the Canadian photographer Richard Martin, and my photographic world changed. He taught me to photograph subjects that most other photographers ignore, like rust spots on junk cars, trash in the street, peeling paint on walls, and unconventional views of unimportant buildings. I learned to love to make images in which the subjects are recognizable and enjoyable, but are less important than the abstract shapes and colors that make them up. What I enjoy the most is finding images that other photographers don't see. I make no attempt to follow the rules; I shoot to please myself. But I must admit I am particularly happy if others tell me that they enjoy my work, or, even more, if they emulate it.



#### TECHNIQUE

The first step in creating innovative images is to find exciting subjects in unlikely places and to recognize extraordinary images where others see ordinary objects. To find innovative images, I pay attention to my surroundings. I try to cultivate what **Freeman Patterson, FPSA**, calls "the art of seeing." He quotes Monet: "In order to see, we must forget the name of the object we are looking at." If one does that, the composition becomes more important than the object. Patterson goes on: "Your ability to see is not increased by the distance you put between yourself and your home. If you do not see what is all around you every day, what will you see when you go to Tangiers?"

I always carry a camera-that's easier now with the advent of iPhones. I have trained my eye to look for possible compositions wherever I go, as I walk or drive past things. The interesting objects may be very small-rust spots on the arm of a bench, for example. They may not easily fit a vertical or horizontal format; one may have to rotate the camera. I make a point of looking down-colorful curbs and grates in the street may make good compositions. I look everywhere: light shining through a tumbler on the kitchen windowsill and reflecting on a white counter; a reflecting metal plate in an airport terminal; standpipes on the side of a building; an urn in the doorway of a chain restaurant; shadows of leaves on a colorful wall; even a bag in the street. I was on a landscape workshop in the Palouse and we drove past a decaying combine. I begged the leader to stop and we all got great shots. Another time in the Palouse I saw rusted cars behind a Subway, stopped there and got a picture that, with a little work, became a cover of the PSA Journal. On a cruise in Alaska the ship stopped in Petersburg and while most of the passengers went into town I wandered around the harbor and found a lovely rusted faucet. Anything goes.

I also look for buildings that the casual observer might just admire from a distance, but become more exciting when studied through a viewfinder. I can find brightly painted homes, each a different color from its neighbors, in many parts of the world, from my home base of San Francisco to Venice or Oaxaca. Sometimes I can show one colorful building flanked by portions of one or two others of contrasting color, to make it even more interesting. I spent a day in the nearby beach resort of Capitola and found some great reflections in colorful buildings there. It just takes paying attention. While in a taxi in New York I saw some great shadows on a blue building and made the driver stop.

I make a point of going to art galleries and looking at the photos on display there. Generally they would not be accepted in PSA-recognized exhibitions, but they can give me good ideas and also inform my judging.

I find flat light best unless there are interesting shadows that make good compositions in themselves. I carry a close-up filter for small objects. I usually work on the images after I have shot them. I clone out distractions, move objects that don't look like they are in the right place, and often play with the colors. There are filters for Photoshop that can improve the originals, and I don't hesitate to use them.

The most important thing of all is to be flexible, and take what the world gives you at the moment. ■

Titling your Images, etc!

As I sit here putting together your Foto FanFare Newsletter, I can't help groaning when I see Misspelled words, Incomplete information, Boring titles, Inappropriate titles, etc!!!

PLEASE make sure that your Words are correctly Spelled in your Titles and if you are not sure of the Spelling, use a Dictionary or Spell Check!

If you are submitting your image into Journalism or Nature, No Cutesy titles, and please include the Pertinent information. If there is a person in your Journalistic photo, Who are they and What are they doing or What is happening and Why?! If your image is in Travel, Where are you and What are they doing and Why?!

Boring Titles are the Worst! Make your information Interesting!

Finally, make sure that your Photo is in the Correct Category! If you are not sure, go to the N4C web page at <a href="http://n4c.org/definitions/">http://n4c.org/definitions/</a> and Read the Definitions and look at the Excellent Photograph Examples showing each Definition!!!

This is from the Judge's Manual by an excellent past Judge – please read!

#### LOOKING FOR PROPERLY TITLED IMAGES by ELEANOR WEBSTER

A good title can add a great deal to the viewing of an image. With Pictorial Projected Images, and Color and Monochrome Prints the title may not be as important as it is for the Special Divisions: Nature, Journalism, Travel and Creative.

#### NATURE

In the Nature Division a maker should present a title, which adds to the story shown in the image. The use of "cutesy" titles, such as "Mommy Duck with Babies Looking for Dinner" is not a good Nature title. Much better would be "Female Mallard Duck with Ducklings Search for Food". The maker should always include Where the image was taken and although not required, it would be informative for the maker to have included the scientific name as well.

#### **JOURNALISM & TRAVEL**

In both Journalism and Travel the maker should, as in Nature, give a title, which adds to the story in the image. In Journalism it is important for the maker to have included the Name of the Event and/or Place where it was taken. In Travel the maker must not assume the viewer knows where the Coliseum, Big Ben or Taj Mahal are and therefore should always state the Place and Country where the image was taken.

#### CREATIVE

In the Creative Division the maker should try and be as creative with his/her title as he/she is with the making of the image.

## **Overview of the FotoClave 2014 Competition Process**

## FotoClave 2014 Competition Categories:

**Projected Images (PIs):** Pictorial, Nature, Creative, Travel, Journalism **Prints:** Color, Monochrome, Nature, Creative

## FotoClave 2014 Judging Rules:

There are 2 sets of judgings, each of which is handled a little differently.

### 1. First judging for "Accepted" images.

This requires one or more judges who are good judges and will not be biased in knowing who is the author of a particular image but will choose the images that are most likely to win at the final judging. The method of judging is up to each Club selected for this first judging.

## 2. Final FotoClave judging

This requires one or more judges who are outside all 3 Councils, in that they have not been affiliated with a club in any of the 3 Councils for several years. This judging is typically done by the selected Clubs by scoring the entries.

## FotoClave 2014 Timeline

August 11 -

N4C Print entries for FotoClave competition will be brought to N4C Board Meeting for exchange. Some clubs will have an assigned judging task to reduce all entries in the Division for which they are responsible to a total of 20, no more than 2 for any one entrant.

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August 11 Midnight Deadline for the clubs to submit Print Info and digital images and PIs to the N4C server.		
August 14	Clubs assigned to do the Pl judging will be notified when the competitions are ready for downloading to the club. Competitions must be retrieved for the competition designated for the particular club to judge. Requires that one of the members of that club be made a Competition Manager at the N4C website. In this first round of judging, the Divisions are to be reduced to the 20 "accepted" images for each Division using ICM.	
September 8	All N4C prints (both the usual monthly prints and the FotoClave prints) will be returned to the N4C Board Meeting. The non-accepted prints will be organized by club to be returned to the club delegate. The Accepted Prints will be retained in the appropriate boxes which have been provided. They must be sorted by Print Division.	
September 20	<b>First FotoClave Exchange meeting at the Marriott Pleasanton Hotel on the intersection of 580 and 680, 1 PM.</b> Prints will be given to the appropriate Council (6C or SJVCCC) for final judging. These Councils also submit their 20 per Division electronic images for both Prints and PIs to the corresponding competitions on the fotoclave.net website. N4C is responsible for a final judging of electronic images.	
September 20	Deadline for N4C clubs assigned to judging PIs to return winners via ICM.	
Sept 21 -Oct 11	An outside judge or judges (from outside all three councils) will be chosen to conduct the final judging – five places plus three equal HMs will be chosen for each division. Judges are not usually paid, but it is up to the Council to decide this issue. N4C will be handling the judging of electronic images; the other two Councils will be judging prints. The judging results will be placed on the fotoclave.net server. N4C is responsible for the collection of prints at the second Exchange (see below), the judging for the best print of the Competition and the display of the prints at FotoClave. <b>Gene Morita is the overall print chairman for FotoClave (<u>etm@lvha.net</u>).</b>	
October 12	Second FotoClave Exchange at the Pleasanton Marriott Hotel, 11950 Dublin Canyon Road in Pleasanton at 1:00 PM. All accepted prints will be returned to N4C with the winning prints separated from the others. Non-accepted prints will be returned to the proper Council. N4C is responsible for the awards. The results of the judging must be submitted to the fotoclave.net server.	
November 7 - 9	FotoClave – Winning and Accepted prints and Projected Images will be displayed at the meeting. These prints should be picked up by the Councils at the end of the display period for the prints. The Electronic Image Coordinator, Gene Albright genea.genea@comcast.net), is responsible for producing the slide show. This can be delegated, of course.


